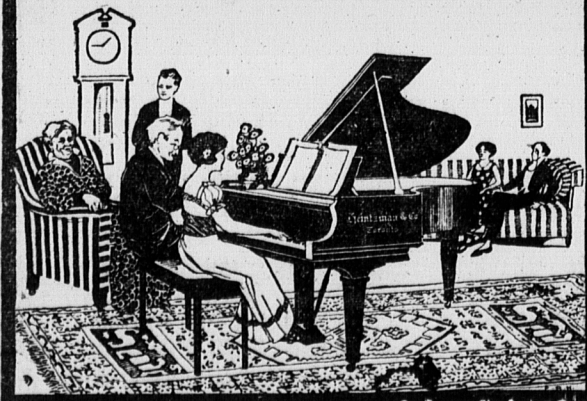

DROP IN POTATOES ABROAD.—A drop is reported in the price of potatoes in the United States and upper Canadian markets due to the milder weather which permitted shipments being sent in.

SUPREME COURT.—The Supreme Court met at Georgetown yesterday Mr. Justice Hazard presiding. The docket is a very small one and there is very little business before the court.

FUNERAL YESTERDAY.—The funeral of the late Mr. Austin Judson took place yesterday from his home at Alexandra, and was very largely attended, people from far and near being present to pay their last tribute of respect to the memory of this splendid young man.

HORSEMEN'S MEETING.—The members of the Charlottetown Driving Club are holding a meeting tonight in the Secretary's office for the purpose of completing arrangements for the ice races. There are interesting matters to talk over in connection with the different classes and a big attendance of members is expected.

DROP IN HIDES.—There was a drop in the price of hides yesterday. They took a decline from 25c to 20c and calfskins were down to 40 cents, a decline of ten cents. Sheep pelts remain the same as previously from \$2 to \$3 each. The market yesterday was rather small. Poultry was in limited supply and the price asked showed no change from what it has been all along. A few eggs were retailing at from 65 to 70 cents a dozen and butter 94 cents a pound. Beef by the car was selling from 14 to 18 cents. Pork sold at 23 to 23 1/2 cents per pound; loose hay at \$1.20 per cwt., potatoes \$2.00 per bushel.

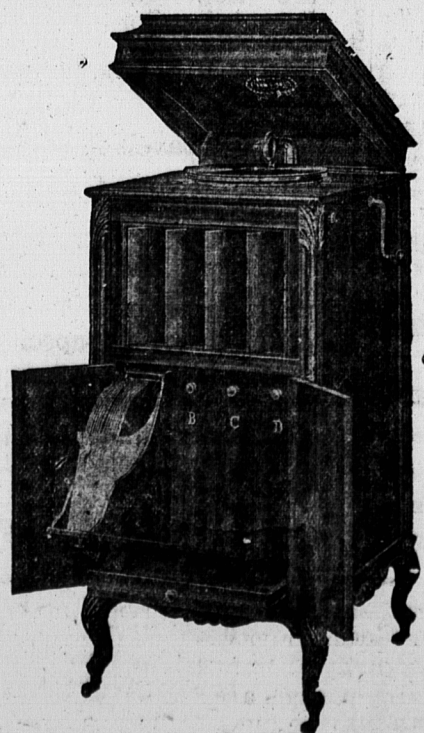

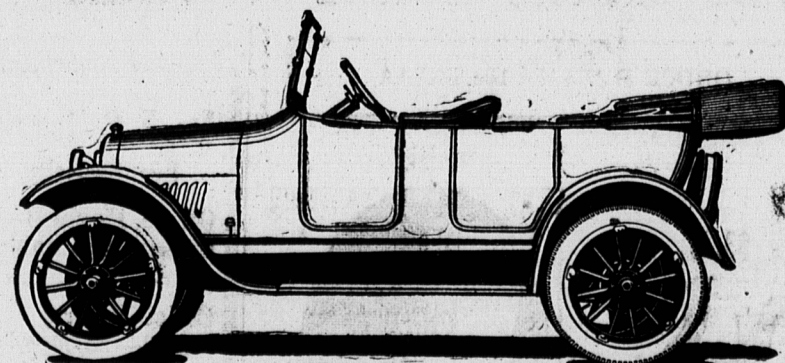
