Asks Premier To Re-consider Case Of Returned Men

TORONTO, Dec. 7.—Telegraphing the Premier Right Hon. McKenna King today Mayor Foster questioned reconsideration of the action of the D. S. C. R. in cutting off relief to men with less than 20 percent disability. The mayor's telegram was as follows: "There is a pronounced widespread dissatisfaction with the government's order reducing relief allowance for returned soldiers and increased hardship is anticipated among hundreds of families who will be rendered destitute and become a charge upon the municipalities. I respectfully request re-consideration of the matter."

HARD PROBLEM FOR LEAGUE TO DECIDE

Controversy of Im-mense Importance has Arisen Regarding Agenda of Arms Conference.

GENEVA, Dec. 7.—A controversy of immense importance to the future of the League of Nations has developed in the League Disarmament Council which is laying the foundation of an eventual international conference on disarmament to which the United States, as well as Russia, will be invited. France and Belgium are insisting that the proposed special commission which will prepare the agenda for the conference, should study the possibility of devising a plan for rendering more precise the obligations of the member States to render assistance to the League when any State has resorted to war in defense of the League covenant.

This brings in Article XVI of the Covenant which endures the Locarno conference before Germany received practical assurance that her especially weakened armament position would be taken into account in case Germany as a member of the League should be called upon to help in the imposition of penalties on any aggressor State.

B. C. Liquor Sales Over 6 Million In Five Months

BELGRADE, Dec. 7.—Premier Pachitch, of Jugo-Slavia, is seriously ill. Mr. Pachitch for 40 years was one of the leaders of Serbia and of the state which succeeded Serbia after the war, Jugo-Slavia. He is believed to be well over 80 years old, although this topic he does not like to discuss. His father lived to be 110 years old.

The girl, Marcelle Monselt, 25 years old a Parisienne former a military nurse and artist's model is in jail charged with espionage. The police believe they have found a link which will enable them to break up a regular espionage system, the Sun says.

Wembley Guarantors Called On To Pay Up

LONDON, Dec. 7.—Guarantors of the British Empire Exhibition are now being called upon to pay 75 percent of their guarantee that is 15s. for every £1 guaranteed as stated by Canadian Press in Ottawa. Announcement of the amount guarantors have to provide was officially made today. The total loss incurred through the holding of the big show at Wembley last year and other years is over £1,500,000. Of this amount the British tax payers will have to provide £825,000, the government guaranteed £1,100,000.
