**P. E. ISLAND ATTRACTIONS.**

For the two or three months to come tourists from the inland and southern portions of the continent will be seeking for cool pleasant and beautiful resorts, just such as those in which our island abounds. Unfortunately for a limited number of these pleasure-seekers are yet aware of our delightful retreats, cool breezes and unparalleled extent of bathing beaches. The Island has not been advertised as other summer resorts have been. New Brunswick and Nova Scotia have this year followed in the wake of Maine and through the agency of tourist associations have distributed a considerable amount of literature directing attention to their beauty spots. In this connection we may mention that THE GUARDIAN has received the neat and attractive Guide to John and its Vicinity, with illustrations showing the special attractions there.

To partially supply the desired information in regard to P. E. Island to those abroad THE GUARDIAN has prepared a column in which an outline is given of information such as is generally desired by tourists. Speaking of the seven millions of revenue derived from the drink traffic by Canada, Hon. George E. What does it cost us to get that seven million dollars? We lay out forty million dollars to get it, and in so doing we blight our temporal and eternal prospects by flooding the country with a liquid poison. Out of this seven million dollars it takes six million eight hundred thousand dollars to meet expenses as the result of the criminal life of our country, and three-quarters of this crime can be traced directly to the use of strong liquors."

**EDITORIAL NOTES.**

A private letter to the editor of THE GUARDIAN from a Canadian now with the fleets, under date of June 30th says: "The Spaniards starve but erect new batteries daily, so the event when it comes will be yarm. My hope is to go into Santiago with the fleets, but I doubt if Sampson's ships go further than the sunken Merrimac."

And now Cervera tells that the Colon had none of her big guns on board at the time she was destroyed! The money that should have armed the ships with modern cannon was stolen in the Spanish ordnance department and the ships sent out to fight without them. With only light guns on board it is not surprising that the Spanish fire was so harmless.

The Examiner quotes the gross debt and assets of the Dominion on 30th June, as follows:

Gross debt	\$336,731,047
Assets	79,117,140
Net debt	\$257,613,907

It may be of interest to add the gross debt, assets and net debt two years ago, just before the Laurier government came into power. As stated in the public accounts they were:

Gross debt	\$325,717,536
Assets	67,220,104
Net debt	\$258,497,432

The net debt is therefore considerably less than it was two years ago, though the Examiner, gives its readers a very different impression.

In the years from 30th June, 1892, to 30th June, 1896, inclusive, under the late government the gross debt of Canada increased considerably as shown by the following figures:

1891—Gross debt	\$289,899,229
1896 " "	325,717,536
Increase	\$ 35,818,307

In the same period the net debt increased as follows:

1891—Net debt	\$237,809,030
1896 " "	258,497,432
Increase	\$ 20,688,402

Here the increase of the net debt was over four millions a year for the five years, as compared with a decrease during the part two years.

There is unfriendly feeling between Sampson and Schley, the former, who was of Captain's rank, having been promoted over the head of the latter, who was a Commodore. Sampson was absent down the coast when the Spanish fleet was destroyed, but Sampson's telegraphic report of the battle did not mention Schley who

was in command at the time. New York Herald tells that Sampson forbade Schley making a report of the action and said to him: "Commodore Schley, my flagship was in signalling distance, as you well know. Had this effort of the Spanish fleet to escape been successful or had it brought disaster to this fleet would you have assumed responsibility?" Commodore Schley is said to have hesitated when the matter was put to him in that light. "Then I cannot allow you to take credit for the victory, to my disparagement," Admiral Sampson is said to have informed him.

At the great reception which was given him in Toronto the other day Dr. Oronhyatekha, the head of the I. O. Foresters, among other things said: "The Independent Order of Foresters during 1897 issued 33,528 new policies. There are fifteen old-line insurance companies of Canadian origin doing business in Canada today, and during 1897 these fifteen Canadian old-line companies issued 33,322 new policies, less by two or three hundred than the number issued by the Independent Order of Foresters alone. Now what is still more remarkable is the fact that the 33,322 policy-holders in the old-line companies carried only \$37,000,000 of insurance as against \$39,000,000 of insurance issued by the Independent Order of Foresters. That is to say that this order issued two millions more than all the insurance companies put together. The order paid to its beneficiaries last year \$992,000, or over \$3,200 a day, to the widows and orphans of deceased Foresters."
