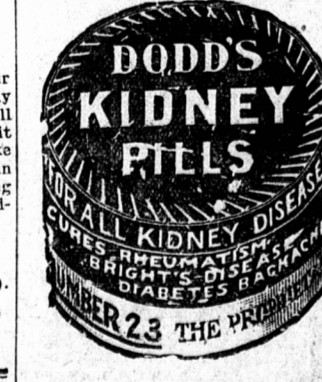

GEORGETOWN SHIPPING.—Owing to unfavorable winds for the last few days no schooners came into Georgetown harbor until Tuesday. On Tuesday however the strong morning breeze blew from early morning brought numerous vessels into port, some seeking shelter until the wind should abate, others which had been waiting for favorable winds coming to share in the shipping in which all the business firms are engaged. Among those which have entered for the purpose of loading in Georgetown and vicinity are the following:—The schr. Etta Vaughan, which sailed some time ago from Yarmouth, N. S., in ballast, came into port here on Tuesday. Capt. Thorburn intends taking her directly to the wharf at Lower Montague where he will take in a load of produce for W. A. Poole & Co. Another Nova Scotia schooner taking a cargo of produce in the schr. Louise, with Capt. Worthen in command. Capt. Worthen took the Louise in ballast from Barrington, N. S., and intends sailing to Newport where he will take in a load of produce for A. A. McDonald & Bros. From St. John's, Newfoundland, comes Capt. Mitchell intends loading produce at the wharf at Lower Montague for W. A. Poole & Co., which he will take for disposal to Burin, Newfoundland. The schr. Jessie M. from the same place as the last mentioned, came into port here some days ago. Capt. Hoben sailed on Tuesday for Annandale, his vessel having been chartered by W. A. Poole & Co., to take aboard a cargo of produce for them at that place. The S. S. Enterprise on her tri-weekly trip to Montague deposited a cargo of way freight at Georgetown on Tuesday, when she cleared for Montague. On Tuesday the Schr. Scotia, with Capt. Clark in command, sailed for Annandale to take aboard a load of produce for A. A. McDonald & Bros. The schr. Edith, which for some time past has been loading at the wharf at St. Mary's Bay for Horatio Graham & Co., came in here on Tuesday on her way to Arichat, N. S., where she is taking her cargo. Capt. Walker commands her. Several vessels have been loading at the wharves in Georgetown harbour, during the past week. Among them are the schr. Shamrock with Capt. Fearson in command which has been loading produce for A. A. McDonald & Bros. Also the schr. Myrtle commanded by Capt. Wounded, finished loading here lately. Her cargo (of produce), was loaded by A. A. McDonald, and now Capt. Wounded is waiting for a favourable opportunity to sail for his destination, Burin, Newfoundland. The harbour presented rather a busy scene on Tuesday evening, no fewer than twenty-four vessels being in port here. Some of them came in seeking shelter, on their way up the Gulf, but the majority are bound for Montague, Cardigan and other places in the vicinity to take on their cargoes while the fall shipping continues. At the Railroad Wharf also is the G. G. S. Constance which is staying here for some time. The Constance is a welcome visitor in Georgetown, for owing to her headquarters being stationed here in former years, her officers and men are well and favourably known in Georgetown, and a good reception always awaits them. G.

POULTRY MEETING.—On Tuesday evening last, Mr. Benson of the Dominion Department of Agriculture addressed a meeting in the Temperance Hall at Kensington on the subject of fattening poultry and the care of poultry in general. The meeting was presided over by Mr. William Walker who, before introducing the speaker gave the report for the Kensington Egg Circle. He stated that so far 8760 dozens of eggs had been shipped securing a return of \$2,179.80 cts., the average price being 23 1/2 cents per dozen. Mr. Benson then took charge of the meeting and after remarking on the success which has attended the establishment of the Egg Circles, took up the question of fattening poultry and the advantages of the crate method over the pen method, also the proper food to be given. He also dwelt upon the proper killing of poultry packing for market, proper kind of house, etc. A discussion ensued after the lecture and after the conveying of a vote of thanks to Mr. Benson for his instructive lecture, the meeting came to a close. K.
