JURY SEES SHOES OF DEAD BOY

ALBANY, N. Y., Mar. 12.—With the resumption tomorrow of the trial of Mrs. Edith Melber, charged with the murder of her son George, the prosecution will continue its efforts to prove that the woman was aware of what she was doing when she left the boy lying dead in a lonely swamp near this city after killing him with carbolic acid, as alleged.

A pair of little, soiled shoes, plain and strong, the sort that are discarded to children in charitable institutions, lie on the table in the courtroom, constantly before the eyes of the jury.

They have been identified by Mrs. Smith, the grand-aunt of the dead boy, as the shoes he had on when he left his house in Schenectady with his mother the last time the aunt saw him alive. They incite, according to the prosecution, that Mrs. Melber, when she killed her son, was capable of appreciating the enormity of her act. She thought, the prosecution holds, the body probably would keep hidden until the winter months had destroyed all traces of identification, but she must destroy tell tale clues, so she took off the shoes and hid them. She did this, according to the prosecution, because the shoes were of the kind that would direct the detectives to every institution in the country to seek a missing boy in the event of the discovery of the body.

In Mrs. Melber's relations with Howard Kirk, a Schenectady admirer, and her alleged hope that he would marry her if she could rid herself of the child, the district attorney believes the motive for the crime lies.

This is the fabric the defence must tear apart if they are to convince the jury that Mrs. Melber was incapable of appreciating what she was doing when she killed her son. The jurors, who range in age from 27 to 69 years, are all married, and all but one have children of their own.

The defence, it is believed, will endeavor to prove that her lack of early training and home influences, her being left to shift for herself at the age of 13; her subsequent battles with poverty and illness; her marriage to a consumptive husband; her experience in the poor house, the birth of George after her release and her husband's death, followed by the constant struggle to support the boy and herself, were sufficient to have weakened her mental powers and render her irresponsible.

A battle of alienists is looked for before the trial ends, but whether Mrs. Melber herself will be sworn has not been indicated.

ONTARIO LINEMAN ELECTROCUTED

BELLEVILLE, Ont., March 13.—Henri Valee, a French-Canadian telephone lineman was electrocuted this afternoon by touching a live wire of the Trenton Electric Power line. He fell dead across an arm of the pole, where his body remained until the power was shut off. He was twenty-seven years old and was from Montmagny county, Quebec, where he was to have been married next week. An inquest will be held.

of his bill. Respecting wages, a man can get \$2.50 to \$7 a day, according to his trade and ability. Work is plentiful enough during summer months (for those who need it), but when winter comes on there is very little doing. It usually takes all the man's earnings in summer to keep him in winter; and if a man can secure a place to work for his household he is very thankful. On the other hand a man may be hired on the farm where the wages rate from \$30 to \$35 a month or \$300 per year, but very few farmers keep a man in the winter season—only those that keep a large stock, and that I can assure you is no easy task, as the feed is stacked outside and is then carried in by the arml in all sorts of weather. One man I know of went out to feed up and got caught in a blizzard and was lost for an hour and a quarter, having got both hands and feet badly frozen. So you can readily see, Mr. Editor, that it is not all smooth travelling in the West any more than it is on P. E. Island. There is one thing, a person can get out decently, not like P. E. Island, where they have to tackle up to a boat like a horse and pay \$2 for the privilege of drawing His Majesty's mails across the Straits.

With regard to prices of food stuff: Beef, pork and mutton are from 15 to 18 cents a pound; eggs, 30 cents a dozen; butter, 30 cents a pound; potatoes, \$1 a bushel, and everything else accordingly. The weather here now is beautiful. The snow in town is gradually going, but is still firm in the country. We have had a very severe winter, January being the worst month. The thermometer registered from 20 to 40 degrees below zero every day. Blizzards have been frequent. The farmers don't expect to get to work until the latter part of April.
