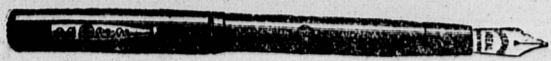

Mrs Hannah J. Morrison died at her home No 4 Trenton St., early Monday morning. She had reached the good age of 85. Her life was quiet and lovely and she lived to see her dearest hopes fulfilled. She was born in Bedeck, Cape Breton, where her ancestors had gone from the United States in the stormy days of the revolutionary wars, and she belonged to the good stock that produced the heroes of those early times. She was twice married, her first husband being George Hill, by whom she had two children, John D. and Mrs Mary Doull, both of whom reside in East Boston, and with whom together with her daughter Sarah she lived; her second husband was Kenneth C. Morrison; they were married in Prince Edward Island, and four children were born to them—Charles H., Angus L., George D. and Miss Sarah A. Morrison; all of these except Angus reside in East Boston; the latter is living now in New Bedford. Kenneth Morrison, her husband, died in East Boston, September, 1902, after an adventurous life in the mining camps of the west. She lived to see descendants of the fourth generation. Mrs Morrison had been failing for the last few years yet she kept bright and cheerful, two weeks ago she was compelled to take her bed and from it she did not arise. Her last moments were in keeping with her life of faith; she raised her hands and whispered, "Glory." The gates opened and she entered in. She has earned her rest. The funeral service was conducted at the house on Wednesday afternoon by Rev Herbert A. Manchester, pastor of the Presbyterian church. The burial was at Woodlawn.—East Boston Argus—Advocate, Nov. 13.
