The salaries on home mission fields this year are: For married ordained men \$680, and \$75 for horse keep, and a furnished parsonage; for single ordained men \$515, and \$75 for horse keep; for unmarried men \$335 and \$75 for horse keep. It was resolved to ask the church for an increase in givings of \$150,000 over the income of the past year to enable the Board to meet all its obligations fully. In the act of parting with the patients the visitors said they were pleased to see them so comfortable and hoped to have the pleasure of calling again. Some of the patients expressed a hope to see them and said: "Yes, come again."

The Sydney Post says: In company with Officer John McDonald and Postmaster Musgrave, of North Sydney, James S. McDonald, arrested at Summerside, P. E. I., last night charged with the robbery of a mail bag at North Sydney on Monday night containing a package of money containing \$3,500 and four registered letters, arrived here on the late express at 11.50. Contrary to reports, McDonald looked better than he has for some time. During the run of thirty-seven miles to North Sydney the prisoner chatted cheerily with the Post reporter but refused to say anything in connection with the robbery. "I have nothing to say," replied McDonald, in answer to a query, "excepting to state that I have been grossly misrepresented by the Charlottetown papers, and therefore consider it unwise to say anything." On arrival at the station the prisoner was conveyed in a covered carriage, followed by a large crowd, and placed in a cell in the lock up. The preliminary hearing will take place before Stipendiary A. R. Forbes. McDonald will be represented by counsel, but refuses to state who his attorney will be. He shows no signs of fear, but is in good spirits and a buoyant mood.
