THE PACKHORSE IS PRACTICALLY EXTINCT

Breeds of Horses Declining in Great Britain—Some Well-Known Strains Not Now to be Found—But Other Kinds are Taking Their Places.

LONDON, Feb. 20.—The question is again suggested as to whether the various breeds of horses belonging to the empire have progressed as they should have done. The number of breeds has not to a great extent diminished, but still some loss in that direction has occurred in the space of half a century. The packhorse of Devonshire, Somersetshire, and Cornwall is now to all intents and purposes extinct. Then, again, where is the match trotter of the thirties and forties? The Derbyshire and Lincolnshire black horse, if to be traced at all, is merged into the composition of the shire. These losses can well be reckoned as serious, when the elements of such animals are duly considered, as the packhorse was everything at one time—hitch, hunter, trapper, and perhaps the very element of all next to the thoroughbred. Stallions were advertised some sixty years ago to trot sixteen miles an hour on a king's highway, and in the same period to run a four-mile steeplechase over a stiff banking course—they tell you in South Devon now that the last of the sort straining to the old Cotagers was a horse called Safeguard, and that a gentleman from Australia took him to the Southern Cross late in the seventies. Then the old black horse of the counties, had not he the reputation of sending certain qualities with the thoroughbred to make up what some people considered the weight-carrying hunter? But to have done with the losses, for, perhaps the science of breeding has improved; or one may say, is still improving the vast majority of our breeds. The various kinds are very numerous, more than any other nation can boast of—the thoroughbred, the hunter, the shire, the Clydesdale, the Suffolk, the Cleveland, the Yorkshire coach horse, the hackney, the polo pony, the Dartmoor ponies, the Eskmoor, the Welsh, the New Forest, the Compton, the Fell, the Scotch, crutcher's ponies, and the Shetlands; to say nothing of the efforts made in the colonies to raise comparatively new breeds, such as the Australian racehorse, the whaler, the Indian Arab, the Burmah and other hill ponies, and the Basutoes of South Africa.

KING OSCAR DISLIKES THE KAISER WILLIAM

STOCKHOLM, Feb. 21.—For some months there has been a distinct lack of cordiality on the part of the reigning house of Sweden towards Emperor William, especially in the case of the crown prince of Sweden, who was formerly on terms of such close intimacy with his cousin, the German emperor. In fact, one is tempted to lend credence to the report that was current at one time to the effect that the crown prince had invoked the assistance of the kaiser for the purpose of reducing the Norwegian "rebels" as he described them, to submission, and that he bitterly resented the German monarch's wise refusal to intervene in King Oscar's troubles with his Norwegian subjects. The irritation of the crown prince was rendered still more intense by the kaiser's dispatch of his brother Henry to represent him at the inauguration ceremonies in connection with the assumption by King Haakon of the throne of Norway. In short, feelings quite the reverse of friendly prevail at the court of Stockholm just now towards that of Berlin.

DO YOU WANT TO SEE THE COMET?

GENEVA, N. Y., Feb. 20.—The comet discovered several years ago by M. Giacobini, chief astronomer of the Nice observatory, was observed here for the first time in the western sky last night by Prof. Brooks, at South's observatory.

The position was Right Ascension Zero Hours, thirty-five minutes thirty seconds; declination south fourteen degrees, fifty minutes. This comet, first discovered in the eastern morning sky, has since been around the sun and now becomes telescopically visible in the western evening sky. The comet is moving north easterly.

WILL REWARD BRITISH TARS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—By direction of President Roosevelt, the state department has caused to be prepared testimonials for the officers of the British steamship Statia for their gallantry and humane conduct in rescuing the crew of the sinking American bark Edward I. Mayberry, of New York.

The Statia lay by the sinking bark all night of December 15th, off the North Carolina coast and rescued the survivors early next day with great risk and difficulty.

To Captain Hinds, of the Statia, and third mate Finlay have been awarded gold watches, while gold medals have been bestowed upon Carpenter Samuelson, Boat swain Barrett, and Seaman Hay, Mayne and Willey.

ALBUMEN MADE ARTIFICIALLY

LONDON, Feb. 20.—At a meeting of men of science in Berlin, says the London Mail, Professor Ernest Fischer, writes our correspondent, one of the most celebrated German chemists, announced that he had come to the conclusion, after six years of experiment, that the artificial production of albumen would be possible in the future.

There are some American students at Nanking. Since the mission opened there thirty years ago there has not been any trouble with the natives.

The secretary of the China Inland Mission said he thought it unlikely that there would be any general rising and that he was convinced the Chinese government would not encourage anti-foreign troubles, especially while the Chinese Imperial Commission was visiting the United States and Europe. He added that China was not likely to forget the lesson taught her in 1900, and Japan would certainly warn China against permitting anything of the kind.

CHAMPIONS OF BASKET BALL

KANSAS CITY, Feb. 20.—The basket ball team of Company "E" National Guard (New York), of Schenectady, N. Y., last night won the basket ball championship of the world by defeating the Kansas City Athletic Club 37 to 11.

The players gave an exhibition of rough tactics and the game was called on this account four minutes before the final time was up, when one of the local players without apparent provocation assaulted a visiting player. The score, as it then stood was allowed to remain as final. The Company "E" team outplayed the local men throughout the game and the Kansas City men were responsible for most of the rough and tumble fighting which marred the contest.

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 19.—Admiral Rojestvensky states that he found absolute proof in Japan that Japanese torpedo boats were concealed among the fishing vessels at the time of the North sea outbreak.

HISTORIC CASTLE BEING RESTORED

STOCKHOLM, Feb. 20.—Since King Oscar lost his Norwegian throne and Norwegian palaces, both he and his son are devoting more attention to the restoration of the historic castle of Upsala, which has played so notable a role in the history of Sweden. The castle was founded in 1548 of Gustavus I., the first of the Swedish kings of the Vasa line. It was within its walls that his son, King Eric XIV., murdered with his own hand Count Nils Sture, as well as four other of the most eminent men of the kingdom. It was there, too, that the great synod took place which marked the final victory of Protestantism in Sweden, and it was also within the walls of the castle that Queen Christina abdicated her crown to King Charles X., in order to end her days at Rome, where she lies entombed in St. Peter's.

LONDON, Feb. 19.—Henry Labouchere retires from parliament without regret from the women of Great Britain, for whom he had no sympathy. It was he who referred to the aristocratic dames of the Primrose League as the "Primrose Pollies."

THE RUSSIANS' SAD STRUGGLES

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 20.—Information has reached the Associated Press that the desperate struggle which has been raging in the government between the reactionary and progressive forces is approaching culmination and must end within a few days in the resignation of either of Minister of the Interior for thoroughgoing repression, or of Premier Witte, in favor of the members of the cabinet. The question at issue is the withdrawal of the extraordinary powers conferred in governor-generals throughout the empire, which in many cases, it is alleged, have been exercised for the repression not only of political disorders but also of the political activity of the Liberal party.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Homestead Regulations.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 8 and 28, not reserved may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent receive authority for some one to make entry for him.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans: (1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father or mother, if the father is deceased, or if the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent. W. W. CORY, Deputy of the Minister of the Interior, 1912b1m10.
