Stock Markets At A Glance

CHICAGO, Dec. 11 — (AP) — Grain futures regained most of their losses toward the end of today's trading, after all pits had recorded recessions. Rye at times was as much as two cents up yesterday's close.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 11 — (CP) — Trade was dull and of a local and commission house character as rye futures prices on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange showed a 1-3 higher. Prices moved irregular under light flurries of buying and selling.

Export business in Canadian wheat totalled 700,000 bushels with the United Kingdom reported taking 200,000 bushels and the continent 500,000.

MONTREAL, Dec. 11 — (CP) — A hesitant tone prevailed generally in trading today on the Stock Exchange and Curb Market. Banks managed to set a new high in the indices and utilities were up a bit but industrials, papers and golds were lower on average. Lower trends on Wall Street affected trading sentiment locally.

Trading box score: Total sales: 212,600 shares; mines, 131,000; industrials, 91,600; stocks, higher 70; lower 83; unchanged 67.

TORONTO, Dec. 11 — (CP) — A dribble of selling put some of the cheaper stocks down in today's Toronto Exchange market and the group netted an index loss of 30. Base Metal Stocks also worked downward by 48 in lighter action while the Western Oils gained moderately.

Profit-taking was in evidence in Steep Rock and the price slipped to 2.80 for a net loss of 18 cents. The turnover of 77,000 shares. Minor losses were met by Bank of Montreal and Labrador and in the senior lat, Nickel, Smelters, Hudson Bay and Ventures had losses of small fractions.

NEW YORK, Dec. 11 — (AP) — The Stock Market slipped on balance today after successive rising sessions to 15-year peaks, but weakness was a rarely and many favorites managed to emerge with comfortable plus signs.

Most steels, motors and rails retreated fractions to 2 points or so after a fairly active opening. Dealings then slowed appreciably and recoveries cropped up in the final hour. Aircraft manufacturing issues and specialties success-fully contested the trend throughout.

Labor controversies caused some customers to retire although calling of a steel strike for January was not particularly disturbing inasmuch as this had been expected. The Associated Press 60-stock composite was off 1 of a point at 77, first setback since Dec. 4.

SUMMARY
Lighter marketings coupled with a strong demand served to boost prices of a full 50c at major markets. Feeder buyers met some competition from killers for stockers and feeders carrying a reasonable amount of fresh Canada, with prices advancing a general 50c and some showing an increase of as much as \$1 Winnipeg had some prime steers at a top of \$12.50, a straight load of heavies at \$11.75, and good cows \$8.50 to \$9.25. Receipts also dropped off a little in the Maritimes but quality continued plain although prices were steady. The best of the steers were again quoted at \$10 to \$10.50 f.o.b. country points and down from \$7.50 down.

Western Cattle Markets
Active and stronger markets were seen all through western Canada, with prices advancing a general 50c and some showing an increase of as much as \$1 Winnipeg had some prime steers at a top of \$12.50, a straight load of heavies at \$11.75, and suitable slaughter steers of mixed weights were well taken at \$11.50 to \$12.50. Some lighter weight stocker steers were taken to fill orders at \$8 to \$9.50 and good feeders around \$9.50. All classes moved up 50c at Calgary, with some in-between grades of steers recording an advance of \$1, or more. The best of the steer division crossed the scales at \$11.25 to \$11.90 with a few tops at \$12. An advance in the advance in prices extended to 50c on some grades and the practical top of the steer division was \$11.50, with a few sales \$11.75. High points at other markets were: Prince Albert up to \$10.50 on steers; Moose Jaw an advance of 50c to a high of \$11.50; Saskatoon also up 50c at \$11 to \$11.50 on best steers; Regina up to a top of \$12.25; and Vancouver \$11.25 to \$11.75.
