YOUTH TRAINING COURSES

Under the provisions of the Federal-Provincial Youth Training Agreement training projects for young men and women will be conducted in Charlottetown commencing in November of 1946 and continuing until March 31, 1947. One round trip transportation and tuition will be supplied free of charge, as well as an allowance for board and lodging. Students must be between the ages of 16 to 30 years.

COURSES FOR GIRLS

1. HOME MANAGEMENT: Three (3) courses shall be held, each to last approximately six weeks. First class to open in early November, providing there are sufficient applicants to fill the class. Training shall include Home Management, Handicrafts, Nursing, Cooking, Sewing, Health and other subjects.

COURSES FOR MEN

1. BLACKSMITHING: One (1) five months course in general blacksmithing, woodworking, sleigh and wagon building. Training assigned to qualify for operation of general blacksmithing and repair work. Course to open in early November. Applications for this course should be made immediately.

2. CARPENTRY: Two (2) six weeks courses in Carpentry, building, construction and general farm repair work. First course to open in early January.

3. MECHANICS: Two (2) six weeks courses in Farm Mechanics. Operation and repair of tractors, cars and gas engines. Care and repair of farm machinery, harness making and repair. First course to open early in January.

COURSES FOR MEN AND WOMEN

1. AGRICULTURE: One (1) three weeks course to provide instruction in animal and field husbandry, farm management and other subjects. Course to open in January.

2. One (1) course in Grading and Packing of eggs and poultry and poultry management. Course to last approximately four (4) weeks commencing in January.

All courses are of an intensely practical nature and provide a favourable opportunity for young men and women to improve their knowledge and train themselves for wider and more effective service. Application forms for enrolment on these courses may be secured from the undersigned. Intending enrollees should apply at the earliest opportunity.




