SENT UP TO SUPREME COURT — Joseph B. Arsenault was committed to stand trial at the next session of the Supreme Court on a charge of manslaughter as his preliminary hearing concluded before Magistrate George J. Hurrell on Tuesday. The charge arose as a result of the death of Daniel McQuarrie, young Milton resident, who was found fatally injured on the roadside near a building on Tuesday morning. Hours of Sunday, August 4th, C. St. Clair, Tractor, K. C. represented the Crown throughout the proceedings, while J. J. Johnston, K. C., represented the accused.
