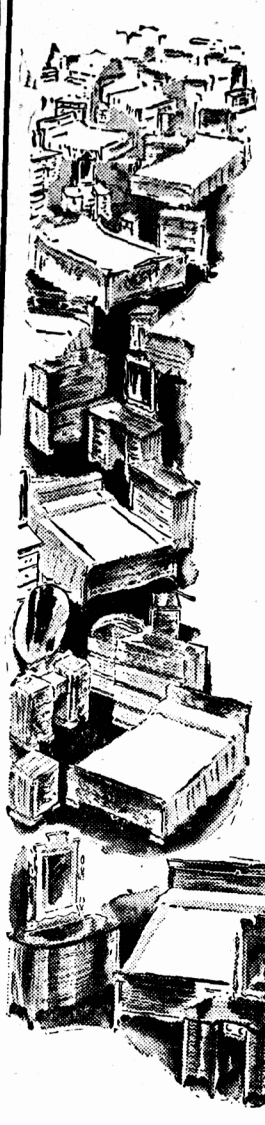

Dr. McLennan said we must give more attention to individuals, the men and women who earn their living performing the basic tasks. It is easy for us to become immune to their pleas for recognition. Do you know an editorial in any newspaper extolling the greatness of a miner. We can never fully pay a man who goes down into the pit to bring up coal for our comfort and well being. There should be recognition of these men and the jobs they are doing. It is a danger that we may think of these men in the same terms as the machines they operate. If Communism takes root anywhere, we may well as ourselves, "Why does this man or particular group of men succumb to the teachings of Karl Marx?" Yet under proper conditions these same men will be a great force against Communism. It would be a great thing if it is of the leading business people, would undertake to give recognition to the ordinary man and the work he is doing. Take for instance the man who sweeps the streets of Charlottetown and all other cities. In his a job recognized as essential, and is personally acceptable to us? If we do not think this man of his own destiny and importance, then he is a danger to the nation, then we are in danger. If he, in his own mind, is assured of these and Christian respect, then he is proof against all the powers the Communists may muster.

HUGE POWER SCHEME TO ALTER GREENLAND

COPENHAGEN, July 25 (Reuters) - An army of scientists, technicians and workers over 6,000 strong is going to Greenland this year in the biggest development drive for electric power production ever planned for Denmark's Arctic colony. The lives of 20,000 Eskimos who live in the world's largest island will be radically changed by the introduction of power plants in four of their biggest settlements. Many Greenlanders will hear radio for the first time, and make their first acquaintance with electric irons, electric kitchens and many other modern devices. A big slaughter house to be built near Julianhaab will be able to handle between 10,000 and 15,000 sheep during a season.

RADIO-PILOT PLANES FAD OF MODEL FANS

LONDON, July 25 (Reuters) - Boys of all ages - from 16 upwards - who want to be up-to-date with their model airplanes must now be able to control them from the ground by radio. A craze for model planes is sweeping England. There are now 450 clubs affiliated to the Society of Aeronautical Engineers and new clubs are being formed at the rate of four a week. Several thousand people watched 400 planes flying in the recent British national contests of the society. They saw radio-controlled models take part in the contests for the first time. In each of the 43 "Queen Bee" planes entered was a tiny receiving set weighing only a few ounces. A magnet valve was operated by lightweight batteries. The radio sets acted either on the rudder or ailerons, and at a touch of a switch or the turn of a knob on the portable transmitter, the "pilot" was able to make
