Changes Dickens Would Find in Modern London

LONDON, March 12 (CP)—Nowadays 48 Doughty Street is bedraggled and empty, the dust from the windows, but Charles Dickens could find his way to the rooms where he wrote Nicholas Nickleby and parts of Oliver Twist and the Pickwick Papers.

In fact, the novelist and the characters he invented could find their way almost anywhere in London with only occasional pauses—like the great empty, empty streets were solid buildings once stood.

Oliver Twist, Bill Sikes, Fagin and even Little Nell would know the long curve of Holborn, Ludgate Circus, Gray's Inn Road and the Strand. This area suffered as many bombs as any part of London but the general design remains.

Only near St. Paul's Cathedral would they feel completely uncertain. Even Pickwick's face would become long at the empty acres around the church where once streets that also harbored Dickens' legends.

But down Ludgate Hill and along Fleet Street and the Strand it's quite like old times, if you ignore broken windows, chipped statues and the smell of gasoline. At Trafalgar Square St. Martin-in-the-Field still spreads the steps where David Copperfield met Martha and Mr. Pecksniff.

St. Mary-Le-Strand, where Dickens' parents were married in June, 1806, remains in spite of all the bombs. St. Clement Danes, also in the Strand, is gutted, but St. Dunstons is poised to strike the clock bell, is unchanged. Along a narrow opening in the row of newspaper offices the Chesnut Chinese does business as it did for 300 years before Dickens lifted a glass on the steps to Whitehall to report the House of Commons for his newspaper.

Doughty Street normally is something of a center of Dickens interest. In 1925, No. 24 became a museum where articles associated with the author could be obtained. Now the museum is closed, but the information is still available. From the site of exploding bombs, across Gray's Inn Road, St. Dunstons Church stands with roof and window gone.

Details of Toronto's New Stork Derby

TORONTO, March 12 (CP)—A "stork derby" in four instalments was in prospect for Toronto last night with the probate of the will of late Thomas Foster, who rose from the city in 1925-27 and died last Dec. 10 leaving an estate of \$1,168,353.

Perhaps impressed by the famous "stork derby" resulting from the will of Charles Foster, which resulted in four Toronto mothers each receiving \$100,000 in 1938, Foster wrote in his will:

"As I appreciate the value of such a fund to the mothers of such families, I direct my trustees to set aside \$200,000 which with interest will provide the sum of \$2,500,000 at the end of each of four years as follows: the first \$200,000 at the end of the first year, the second three years after my death, the third three years after my death and the fourth five years after my death."

The money is to be distributed as follows: the first \$200,000 to the mothers living in Toronto at the start of each year and who have given birth to a child in the year of birth "in lawful wedlock" to children during the 10-year period in question.

In each period the mother giving birth to the largest number of children is to receive \$250. Second prize is \$200 and third \$150.

After all bequests the residue, estimated at \$600,000, is to be divided into four parts which the income trustees go to the University of Toronto for cancer research work in the department of medical research "unperturbed by the problem of cancer has been solved."

Thereafter the income from the residue is to be divided into four parts, one part to be given to the Canadian Medical Association or some other responsible medical body to extend to doctors in training in up-to-date medical sciences.

Original Derby

Toronto's original "stork derby" resulted from the will of Charles Foster, who died in 1927 and left an estate of \$1,168,353. The will provided for four Toronto mothers, Mrs. Lucy Timleck, Mrs. Kathleen Nagle, Mrs. Annie Smith and Mrs. Isabelle MacLellan.

These four mothers had made a settlement with two other claimants, Mrs. Lillian Kenny and Mrs. Pauline Mae Clarke whereby the latter two abandoned their judicial appeals.

Each of the four winners under the will had registered nine births in the period from 1925 to 1937. Foster's will also contained 15 various bequests "to mark my appreciation of my citizenship in the city of Toronto and to provide some citizens or their children opportunities for health or advancement which might not otherwise be theirs."

Beneficiaries of these bequests included charwomen, newsboys, organizations of the Anglican, Presbyterian, United and Roman Catholic Churches, hospitals and school-children.

And the man who collected his own rents even while he was mayor of the city bequeathed to each of his tenants who had paid rent for five years, one month's rent free.

Foster died Dec. 10, 1927, at the age of 83. He was mayor of Toronto from 1925 to 1927 and in those three years was reported to have saved the city \$2,000,000 by his economy. His economy was his watchword throughout life.

He was elected to parliament as a Unionist member for York in 1917 and was defeated as an independent in the Federal election of 1921.
