France to Control All Saar Mines

PARIS, April 23—The Saar Basin agreement in the peace treaty will insure to France complete ownership and full exploitation of the Saar coal and iron mines. The boundary commission definitely defining the frontiers which will enclose the Saar field. It will be described in some detail in the peace treaty by clauses.

France to Care For German Delegates

PARIS, April 23—The French Government has appointed a special military commission to look after the German delegates while in France. The commission is headed by Lieut Col Hardie with a staff of two Majors, three captains and two Lieutenants.

\$22,600,000 German Stock Transferred to Canada

MONTREAL, April 23—Mr. Justice Dugas this morning issued an order transferring stock in the Canadian Pacific Company to the value of \$22,600,000 held in New York on behalf of enemy aliens to the Finance Minister of Canada.

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Probable Settlement Of Japan-China Claims

PARIS, April 23—The Council of Four decided today to discontinue its hearings on the Chinese and Japanese claims to rights in Shantung province and agreed merely to terminate Germany's rights in China in the peace treaty leaving the settlement of the respective rights of China and Japan to the German concessions until a later date.

Italy to Withdraw Dalmatian Claim

PARIS, April 23—There are indications of weakening on the part of the Italian delegation and a disposition to withdraw their demands for the Dalmatian hinterland. If permitted to have the coast, the coastal waters and Flume, the implication of the Italian claims to compromise is looked upon as encouraging by the allies who apparently are hopeful that an agreement may be reached by mutual concessions.

UNITED OPEN AIR PRAYER SERVICE

PENETANGUSHENE, ONTARIO April 13—Protestant and Roman Catholics of this town united on Sunday afternoon in an open-air service of praise and prayer, in which the Roman Catholic priests and the Protestant ministers took part in celebrating the fourth anniversary of the battle of St. Julien. The celebration was held on the field at the back of the Jesuit Church, overlooking the bay, where a cairn marks the landing of Recollet Fathers, 400 years ago.

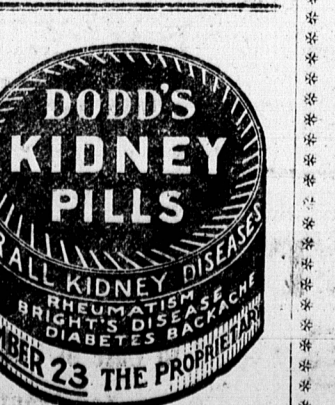
2 1/2 PER CENT BEER

LIEUT. HAWKER'S WIFE IS SURE HE WILL WIN

LONDON, April 23—No one in England is waiting with more calm patience for tidings to Harry G. Hawker and his progress in the air across the Atlantic than his wife with her six months old baby in a quiet villa on a country road in Surrey.

Mrs. Hawker has such confidence in her husband and his machine that her only anxiety is about the weather. "I have been in the air 10,000 feet," she said, "but I have never made a long journey. My husband has talked with me so often about this Atlantic flight that I know all its difficulties and dangers. He has set his heart on it and I would not say a word to deter him. I received a cable from him telling me of his safe arrival, and I have heard nothing since. I know he is working against time."

TRAILER INQUIRY

L. H. C. asks: Will a 23 horse-power auto, on low gear, pull as great a load on a trailer as will one good, strong horse? How should a trailer be fastened to a car to enable it to turn corners properly?

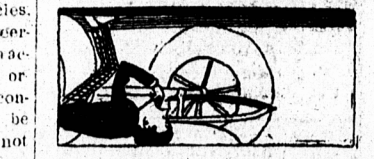
Answer: We have no figures as to the pulling ability of such a horse or as to the actual horsepower of an engine thus rated, and can therefore give you merely an opinion. As a guess, we should say that, on a good road and assuming the wheels not to slip, the car would pull more than the horse could for any considerable length of time continuously, but that the horse could start and pull for short distances a greater load than the car, especially if the road were poor. A two wheel trailer is attached

found by multiplying the torque or twisting force in foot pounds furnished at the shaft by its speed in revolutions per minute and dividing the product by 33,000. The dynamometer is generally of a special type known as an electro-dynamometer,



which measures the torque directly, appropriate allowance being made for electrical and mechanical power losses, and the speed is measured by a tachometer or revolution counter. As you probably know, the horsepower rating given to a gasoline engine is purely conventional and gives little idea as to what it actually can do. It is obtained by multiplying its cylinder Bore in inches, squared by the number of its cylinders and dividing the product by 25. The result represents what an engine may be expected to deliver when each of its pistons is moving at the rate of 1,000 feet per minute.

ARE SNUBBERS OF VALUE



S. H. C. asks: Do not snubbers improve the riding qualities of a car and prevent the snapping of springs by the upward motion of the body after a severe jolt? Answer: They do. In some respects snubbers are superior to other forms of shock absorbers.

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She does not believe her husband can be beaten. Hawker is an Australian of Cornish origin. He was taught to fly at Brooklands in a Burgess-Wright biplane by G.O.M. Sopwith himself, one of the earliest British pilots. Hawker was the winner of the Miskelton prize in 1911. To those who come in contact with him Hawker is a source of amazement by reason of his incredible toughness. He flies high on cold days without extra clothing. He has attained an altitude of 25,000 feet without the use of oxygen, whereas most pilots would, without oxygen, become insensible long before they reached that height.

On some occasions Hawker returned to earth by tipping his machine into a nose dive and coming down like a rocket stick. Only a man of prime physical fitness could have stood such a lung test.
