MINK RANCHING.—Recently, Mr. J. E. E. McCready, the Publicity agent has received a number of inquiries, both from persons within and without the Province, relative to mink ranching and its possibilities as a profitable proposition. Inquiries were made by a Guard an representative yesterday into the matter and he elicited some interesting facts. From Mr. Jenkins, of Messrs Jenkins and Lantz, poultryers and fur dealers he learned that while there is not many engaged in mink farming in the island at present, several have been very successful in their raising of these animals. Mink are to be found within this province in considerable numbers and Mr. Jenkins gave it his opinion, based on his experience, that mink ranching could be made a profitable business. Mink for breeding purposes would realize easily about \$150 a pair, while each time they have young, the litter consists of five or six pups. There is a difficulty however, according to Mr. Jenkins which has to be overcome. He says: "They are very hard to raise unless you get the young ones, the old ones are hard to keep." "But," he added, "some people are raising them very successfully, and there are lots of animals to be found in this province." Mr. Jenkins' experience of mink ranching was more propitious than that of a certain fur-ranching company who, though primarily concerned in fox-breeding, went in also for mink farming. They bought two splendid-looking animals from an Indian and it was only after considerable trouble with them and some expense in feeding and housing them that it was discovered that they were both males. So one night when the mink bit a hole in the fence and left the pen, no effort was made to reclaim them. It was a case of good riddance of bad rubbish. There are so far as can be gathered, about seven or eight persons in different parts of the province who are successfully raising mink.

HARVESTING.—Mostly all the farmers in the Scotchfort district have made a beginning at the harvest. Although in places the oats are light yet there will be an average crop. The wheat never looked better and there is also a good crop of barley with the barns full of hay and good crops of every other kind the farmers of P. E. I., have every reason to feel blessed.

ISLAND AUTO PARTY.—A party from Summerside, Prince Edward Island, consisting of Mr. Frank F. Tuplin, the Island Fox King, his son, Earl, and Messrs. I. Lea Rogers, L. K. Grady, W. A. Allen and G. B. DOMINION LETTER CARRIERS IN SESSION AT WINNIPEG.

Nearly all of the one hundred delegates expected to be in attendance at the biennial convention of the Dominion letter carriers have arrived in Winnipeg, eastern delegates coming in a special car from Toronto. The convention opened its two days' session in the industrial bureau at 9 o'clock on Aug. 29th with President Robert Guy, Hamilton, Ont., in the chair. Many important resolutions are to come before the body for decision, among them being the question of the exclusion of Sundays from annual leave of absence and the proposal that carriers be granted not less than 21 days holidays inclusive of 10 days bonus. Efforts to secure sick pay will be discussed and the convention will probably be instructed to endeavor to obtain pensions for carriers in place of the present superannuation scheme. Definite arrangements for the eight hour per day schedule will be taken and a resolution providing that the executive be instructed to press the Post Master General the weight and regulations whereby the weight and load that any man is expected to carry is fixed will be gone into. Reduction of bonds furnished by letter carriers will be discussed, and also some very important changes.
