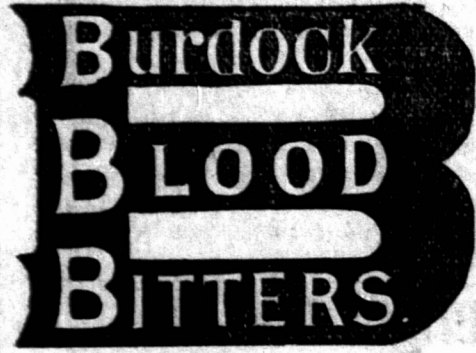

THE WAR SITUATION.

Lord Roberts has distinguished himself over all the generals in South Africa by the great results which he has achieved by strategic movements at a minimum cost of life. The relief of Kimberly, the capture of Cronje and his army, the subsequent capture of the Free State Capital, the advance to Kroonstadt and the practical subjugation of the southern Republic have been all effected with less loss of life than was experienced in one of Buller's or Methuen's lost battles. But we ought not to forget that while great things have been thus accomplished which must increase the fame and prestige which Lord Roberts had achieved in his previous remarkable campaigns, he has had many things in his favor which General Buller had not.

Chief among Lord Roberts' advantages have been his greatly increased forces. He may be said to have had ample strength almost from the beginning of his control in South Africa. He has been operating in an open country as compared with the region between the Tugela and Lady-smith. Roberts has the advantage of a large body of cavalry and mounted infantry, the want of which was so severely felt by other commanders in the earlier stages of the war. No doubt this force has been to a large extent of his own creation, by securing mounts for a considerable portion of his infantry, but he was in that regard able to command resources which were beyond the power of his predecessor.

The same is true of his facilities for transport. Buller and Methuen were practically compelled to operate on or near the lines of railway because they had not sufficient mule and oxteams to enable them to move across country. And again in regard to artillery, the generals who conducted the earlier operations of the war found themselves constantly out-ranged by the guns everywhere brought against them. Lord Roberts has been fully equipped with artillery which out-ranges and is more effective than that arm of the enemy. And it is to be further observed that Lord Roberts, with all his other advantages, has had the able assistance of Lord Kitchener, the greatest master of organization and transport that the British army possesses to-day. We have heard little of what Lord Kitchener and other able men with whom Lord Roberts has surrounded himself have personally done, but no doubt the extent and value of their assistance must in due time be recognized.

These conditions have given Lord Roberts' great advantages over his predecessors, but they do not detract in any way from the glory of his achievements. They are only mentioned here in simple justice to those who were charged with the war operations under widely different and and most difficult circumstances. Probably no other British commander would or could have achieved all that Lord Roberts has effected in the same time and with so little expenditure of blood. The present outlook is exceedingly favorable. The enemy has been distinctly out-generalled, his forces scattered and disheartened and there is now no prospect of sufficient force being brought together at any one point to successfully withstand the onward march to Pretoria.

We do not expect a collapse or surrender at the present time, or until Pretoria is reached, although the entire Boer population must soon be convinced that the struggle is hopeless, and the end may therefore possibly come at any time. The accounts we have of the natural strength and powerful armaments of Pretoria indicate that if stubbornly defended it might hold out for months. Still the end is, as we have said from the first, inevitable. British arms will triumph and the allied Republics will be brought under the British flag, doubtless greatly to their own advantage.

An American gentleman residing in Paris writes to the New York Sun that the great Exposition will not be ready earlier than 23rd June, although hotel rates have already been doubled. He advises Americans who desire to obtain a satisfactory view of the show not to go to Paris earlier than 1st July. The hint may be worth taking by intending Canadian visitors as well.

In speaking at the recent banquet to Sir Richard Cartwright Premier Laurier said: "We shall very soon appeal to the people", but a little later in the same speech he intimated that it was yet uncertain whether the appeal will be made this year or next year. He also expressed great confidence of obtaining a majority in every Province when the appeal is made. And Sir Charles Tupper is also confident!

We have not heard very much about the Gallicians in the North West of late, and this is in their favor, as many of the earlier accounts were not altogether favorable. The Toronto Globe now intimates that they are rapidly adapting themselves to the conditions of the country, and acquiring the same habits and modes of life as English settlers. They show eagerness to speak the English language and great aptitude in acquiring it. A larger proportion of them than was at first supposed have enough money to enable them to equip themselves comfortably on their farms and the prejudices against them as a class are rapidly disappearing.

The wily Japs have perpetrated a sharp trick on the Americans in the Philippines, by shipping thither enormous quantities of Japanese matches. The quantities were so great that the cases were searched
