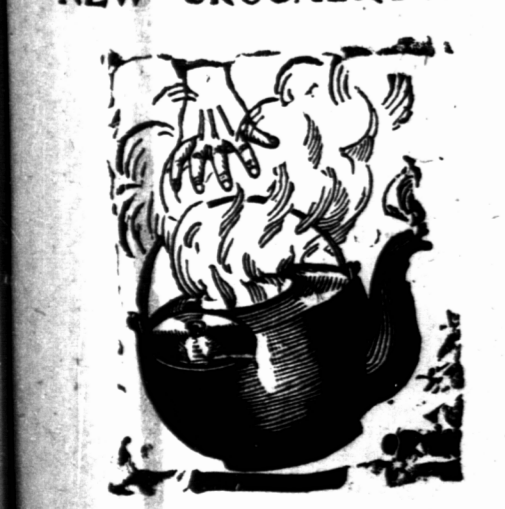

Letter Making an Offer, for Interesting Items Gathered Green Goods Received

By a Well Known Gentleman in Charlottetown. The Offer that Was Made Him by a New York Firm.

A well known gentleman of this city like some in other towns has received a letter from green-goods operators living in New York city. The communication in question is as follows:

Confidential. Friend—I have reason for believing you to be a shrewd, reliable and trustworthy man for me to co-operate with in your vicinity, and for that reason take the liberty of making you a proposition that many men would gladly grasp if they could personally examine my work and convince themselves of the absolute safety of my offer.

The writer of this is an expert engraver, having for 31 years been employed in the Bureau of Engraving, Washington, D.C. I have spent some years back in the effort to make perfect duplicates of my work while in the employ of the government, and have succeeded. My greatest difficulty has been to secure the silk-fibre paper, the same as that which the government use. In this also I have succeeded. The goods come in sizes of Oases, Fives, and Tens; are perfect duplicates of the genuine, and can only be detected by the best bank experts, and then, only when they arrive at the Treasury in Washington, which is not likely to occur in years, and after passing through so many hands that it is impossible to trace them.
