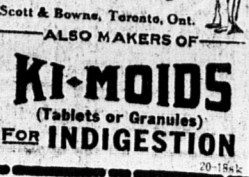

Religious Revival Needed, Declares Mr. Lloyd George

LONDON, Feb. 27.—Religious circles in England including established church and non-conformists are much interested in outcome of the breakfast gathering in Downing Street yesterday when Premier Lloyd George with Mrs. Lloyd George and their daughter, Mrs. Miss Megan, entertained at an early morning meal, a number of leading "free church" ministers. It has been suggested more or less facetiously in some quarters that the Premier, who as a free churchman always enjoyed much non-conformist support, is perturbed by the fact that two Independent Liberals are coming to speak at coming National Free Church Council meeting. Instead, however, of any preference being made to politics at breakfast those present say that the Premier devoted two hours in the midst of his multifarious duties to discussing the state of religion in the country. Premier Lloyd George submitted the proposition that it was urgently necessary for all churches to stimulate spiritual revival in order to improve the material conditions of the people. The Premier supported his contention by references to European and British History and declared that at present England needed a religious revival more than anything else.

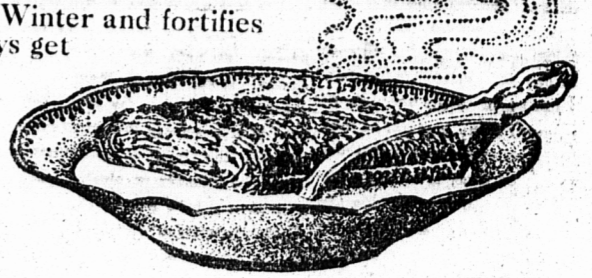

Irish Situation More Cheerful

LONDON, Feb. 27.—Delegates of the Irish Provisional Government conferred for an hour and a half Saturday afternoon at Colonial Office with Mr. Winston Spencer Churchill, Colonial Secretary. Sir Hamor Greenwood, Chief Secretary for Ireland and Sir Laming Worthington Evans, Sec'y. of War. Both sides are reported to be taking a cheerful view of the situation. Discussions are said to have proceeded so smoothly from their commencement that they were able to inform Lloyd George who had been in readiness for a call that he need not disturb his week end. Mr. Arthur Griffith and his colleagues started on return to Ireland tonight. Mr. Griffith after the conference said he was satisfied that the British government was standing by the terms of the treaty. Both Griffith and Duggan seemed hopeful that a healthier atmosphere would prevail because of the mutual recognition of each other's difficulties. It understood that Mr. Winston Churchill will make a statement in the house on Monday or Tuesday on the results of the conference and announce that the Free State Bill will be proceeded with at once in a Committee of the Commons.

Bluebeard Dies Unconfessing

VERSAILLES, Feb. 25.—Henri Desbois Landru, "bluebeard" convicted of the murder of ten women and a boy, gave his life this morning in exchange for the seven he had taken. The singular knife of the gallotine fell at 6.05 a.m., twenty five minutes after the time originally set for execution. The delay caused many to express their astonishment that Landru was making a confession. Mysteriously until death, Landru presented Father Laiselle's query as to whether he had any confession to make. "It is an insult to a man I love, not to his wife," said his wife, "I am confident to make I would have made it long ago." He did not utter the word "innocent" as he had failed to utter it during his thirty four months imprisonment. The twenty-one days of his trial. The slayer rebuffed the Saeremant but converted a few moments with the priest. "I shall be brave, never fear," he told them. Although the plans for the execution had been kept in the utmost secrecy, crowds began to gather about the old Versailles jail a little after midnight. The gates of the cavalry barracks along Georges Clemenceau street in which the execution took place, were closed and the prison was well, and when he awoke he heard the sound of hammers at the work area erected the "timbers of justice" by the flickering lights of lanterns. The gallotine was erected only a few feet from the main entrance of the prison opened slowly, revealing in the courtyard the procurator general, the warden of the prison and Landru's two lawyers. Then Landru appeared clad in dark trousers and white shirt. His beard, which was one of his most striking characteristics, and which has become familiar to thousands through publication of his picture during the progress of his trial, had been trimmed, his head shaved, and his neck and face deathly pale. He walked five steps before the executioner's assistants caught him around the waist and levitated him on the table, which was immediately unopened; the heavily weighted knife slid down, and the

Elaborate Preparations For London Wedding Of Princess Mary

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, Feb. 27.—London ablaze with gay flags and bunting; the capital's streets are thronged with visitors; everywhere there is feverish, popular activity, unprecedented since the coronation of the King. The city is preparing to do honor to Princess Mary who tomorrow in the historic Abbey becomes the bride of Viscount Lascelles. Everything is in readiness for the ceremony which has drawn thousands of visitors from every corner of England and from the Groves of America who are eagerly seeking places of vantage along the wedding route at \$50 a seat. The schedule for the royal wedding has been arranged and will be observed punctiliously, even to the exact minute at which the Royal relatives of the bride shall leave their palaces for the Abbey. The bridal procession with Princess Mary on the arm of her father will move down the aisle of the Abbey to the marriage altar where Viscount Lascelles will be waiting. Sixteen ministers will be there to assist at the ceremony, their numbers equal to an entire cabinet, the addition of Rev. Charles Lascelles, cousin of the Viscount. Besides its riot of gay colors by flag, London will be illuminated by night for an entire week in honor of its Princess and her husband. Popular enthusiasm approving the Princess' choice of an Englishman is just beginning to reveal its height. All the leading hotels have planned banquets for tomorrow night and Wednesday. Twelve men and three auto trucks were required to transport it from the bakery to the main banquet room which has been erected on its massive solid silver base. There is more than a hundred pounds of almonds paste used on it.

Horrible Death at Bathurst

BATHURST, Feb. 27.—Charles Hurd, aged 48 men, a horrible death yesterday afternoon when working at the pulp mill at the Bathurst Company Limited here, when he fell into one of the digesters being charged with chips and caustic liquor. The distressing fatality happened about halfpast four and the remains of the unfortunate man were not removed until 8 o'clock this morning. Hurd was engaged with another man named Chas. Dugan in keeping the chute which leads into the digester clear of chips and in some manner, as yet unexplained, both he and Dugan did not notice the signal given by the pulp cooks that they were about to drop chips into the digester. The two men dropped with the chips when the digester was opened but Dugan was able to catch a beam and hold clear for a short time and when he fell after a few minutes he did not go all the way into the digester.

S. AFRICA TO HAVE DEFICIT, BUT NO NEW DEVISES

Hon. J. Burton, minister of finance for the Union of South Africa, today, told the South African parliament that he anticipated a deficit at the end of the financial year amounting to £1,000,000, according to Reuters's correspondent. The minister, thought, however, it could be wrong to levy additional tax, as he feared that the government was already taking out of the people's pocket money required for developing the country.
