An Army Gratuity.

1. The following Imperial army order (Special), dated 10th June, 1900, is published in militia orders:

"Non-commissioned officers and men of the colonial contingents from Australia and Canada, and of the Imperial irregular corps raised in South Africa for the present war and in receipt of the ordinary army rates of pay, will be entitled to a gratuity of £5 when discharged medically unfit, or on account of their services being no longer required in connection with the war, or at the termination of their engagement.

"If a non-commissioned officer or man dies while serving, the gratuity will be credited to his estate.

"This gratuity will be in addition to the gratuity (if any) given to the troops at the end of the war."

THE dredge, St. Lawrence, Capt. E. C. Lloyd has completed, for the present at least, her work in Summerside harbor and leaves this morning for St. Mary's, Guysboro County, N. S. During her stay of about two months she has dredged through the sand bar inside of the light-house making a cut 200 feet wide and about 1200 feet long, which gives a depth of 10 feet at extreme low water, or 22 feet at ordinary neap instead of 16 and 18 feet in the old channel. The new cutting, owing to the course of the channel has been made at an angle, across the line of the present range lights and will necessitate two new ranges which will no doubt be furnished in the near future. When the new channel is properly marked it will be of inestimable value to the harbor.

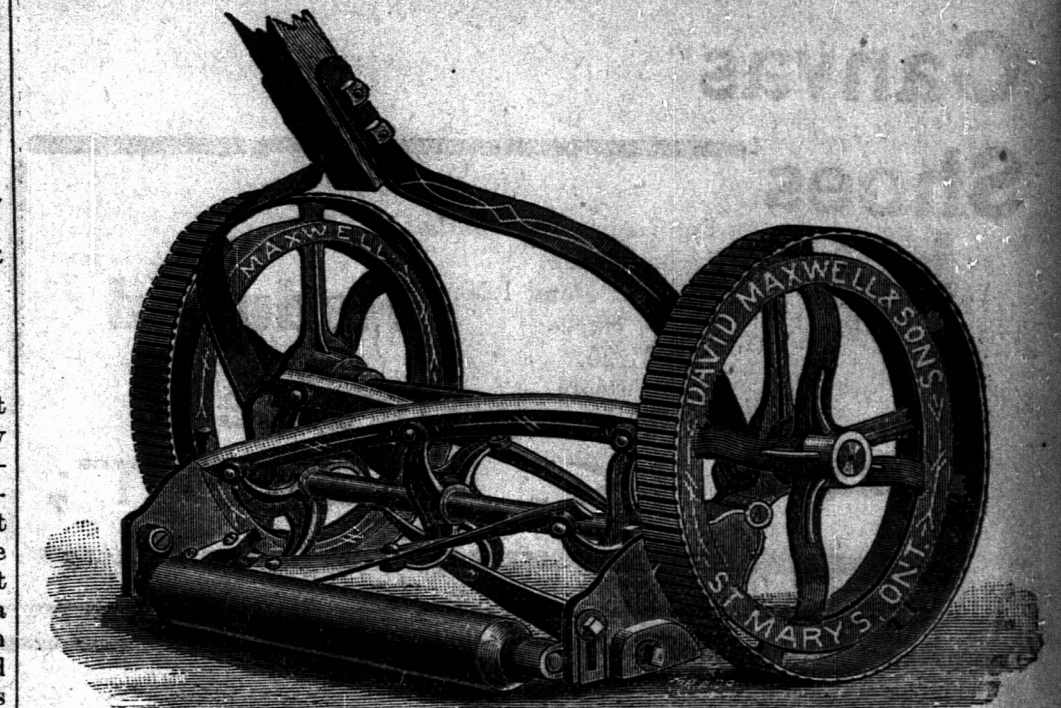
