The regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade will be held next Tuesday evening in the council chamber, when delegates to the Maritime board will be appointed, and other important matters dealt with. All members are requested to be present. The Prohibition cases at the City Police Court were adjourned for further hearing, and the cases of Michael A. O'Brien and George Match adjourned till Saturday 1st of August for judgment. Leo Callaghan was committed to jail for three months for Prohibition violation. The Annual Scottish Gathering, under the auspices of the Caledonian Club of P. E. In connection with the sailings of the S. S. Enterprise, the Post Office Inspector has arranged to have a mail despatched every Monday for Murray River, and every Friday from Murray Harbor, to Pictou, N. S. This service will continue for the remainder of the season. The mails will include matter for all points in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and the United States. This will give an improved service for all offices on the Murray Harbor Branch Railway, to the points above named. The Maritime Farmer contains a letter by A. Gordon, Leavitt, St. John, N. B. on the Brown Tail Moth. He says millions of money has been spent in Massachusetts and adjoining States fighting these moths. The Brown Tail is the worst because the female is a good flyer while the Gypsy moth cannot fly thus the Brown Tail can quickly spread over a large part of the country. The insect injures not only the large and small fruits but elms, maples, oaks, etc. and that it can easily obtain food may be learned from the fact that a list published some years ago gave eighty food plants. The great destruction of plant life is not only bad but the hairs of the larvae (caterpillar) coming in contact with the human skin causes a rash which with some people is very serious. It then gives a description of the life of these insects and describes them.
