REFUSE TO PAY.

LONDON, June 30.—The widespread hostility to Lloyd-George's insurance act as it affects domestic servants and the employers of the same, resulted in a demonstration in Albert Hall to-night which was organized by titled society ladies. Ten thousands of persons, largely maid-servants, attended and cheered the advice of Lady Desart not to pay the prescribed insurance premiums and not to have anything to do with the insurance act. A resolution was adopted unanimously affirming the determination of the girls to resist and not to pay any fees. It is noted

worthy that Lord Desart and his colleagues placed themselves in a similar position during the trial of Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst for inciting a breach of the law. Another large group of society women has arranged a form of benefit society by which they will take the utmost advantage of the act. The promoters carry more weight than those who are opposing the scheme. The women who are pushing the scheme include Princess Alexandra of Teck, the Duchess of Norfolk, the Duchess of Marlborough, the Countess of Crave, the Marchioness of Salisbury, Mrs. Lewis V. Harcourt, Mrs. Astor and a number of members appointed to carry out the program includes the Duchess of Marlborough.

As regards traffic from Charlottetown for Dominion Day the P. E. I. R. established a new record on Monday. Travel was observed to be particularly heavy and an accounting revealed the fact that 600 people left the city via the P. E. I. R. of these 150 went to Summerside.

A curious coincidence was observed at the Ch'Town station yesterday afternoon when two old friends met and exchanged greetings. In the general hand clasp which followed each extended the left hand and it was evident that the misfortunes which had rendered useless for the time the right hand of each but several weeks increase the cordiality of the grip. Each exhibited a bandaged right hand and smiled over the curious and unusual feature of the meeting.

By a recent enactment of the Newfoundland Legislature the exportation of live foxes from "Ye Ancient Colony" has been prohibited, the new act coming into force on Monday last. The Guardian understands that the last pair of foxes shipped from Newfoundland are owned by a Prince Edward Island lady. The foxes, a beautiful pair of blacks, were shipped only the day before the prohibitory law came into force.

Dr. J. Douglas Trueman, St. John, well known in this province, who was drowned in the Rainy River District, Ontario, met death while trying to save the lives of his companions. To those who knew him best, says a St. John exchange, this news did not come as a surprise. After gallantly rescuing Dr. Walcott, who could not swim, he gave up his own chance of safety rather than further imperil the lives of the others. His self-sacrifice was successful in saving the others, but his noble deed cost him his own life. Some further details of the tragedy were received yesterday morning in a telegram to J. MacMillan Trueman, from Dr. R. W. Brock, director of the geological department, who left Ottawa for the west as soon as he was advised of the accident. At the time it took place Dr. Trueman was in a canoe with Dr. Walcott, secretary of the Smithsonian Institute, and a young man named Knox, a second year student of Toronto University, who was with Dr. Trueman as an assistant. They were running the rapids in Steep Rock river, below Steep Rock falls, near the lake of the same name. Dr. Walcott could not swim and Knox was not very familiar with the handling of a canoe. When the canoe was upset, the three men were thrown into the water and Dr. Trueman and Knox rescued Dr. Walcott and helped him to the overturned canoe, to which they clung. Dr. Trueman, believing that the frail craft was not sufficient support for three men, started to swim to the shore to give them a better chance and assistance. He was swimming strongly without signs of distress, when suddenly his companions heard his cry for help. Knox started to his assistance, but was too late and Dr. Trueman sank in thirty fathoms of swift-running water.

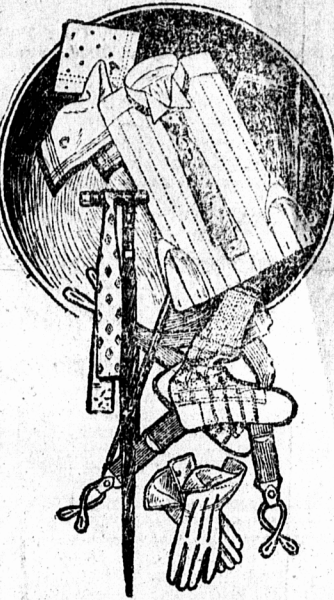
