**A GEODETIC SURVEY FRAME-
WORK**

OTTAWA, Aug. 5.—Every delicate and complicated piece of machinery, such as a typewriter or an ordinary watch, must have all its numerous parts, its keys and levers or its cog-wheels and springs, carefully and accurately adjusted within a properly constructed framework. It is equally necessary that any detailed survey should be based in the most reliable framework which can be obtained.

This fundamental necessity is secured by joining together continuous nets of first order triangulation after they have been already adjusted with such thoroughness that the latitudes and longitudes to all points concerned can be regarded as completely determined from the available data. Further junctions are brought about by running cross links of triangulation between the various nets. The result is a serious of loops enclosed by one main loop. The extent to which the observations of any loop fail to close exactly is called the error of closure of the loop, and all errors of closure have to be distributed throughout the connecting links of the loop in which they occur. This, of course is done in the mathematical adjustment which follows the field work. The loops, as a series, now form a suitable framework to which subsidiary triangulation can be fitted.

An example of this work on an extended scale has recently been completed by the Geodetic survey of Canada, Department of the Interior. Triangulation nets in the vicinities of Toronto, Montreal and Quebec, the Gulf of St. Lawrence, Anticosti Island and in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, together with large areas of triangulation in the New England states, have been jointly adjusted for loop closure on a uniform basis. This uniformity of result is of value, not only to the detailed surveys which follow geodetic work, but also to those who are undertaking any engineering enterprises of any kind.

Among the points finally established by the adjustment here considered, not the least valuable are those which will furnish improved control to the work along the international boundary easterly from lake Ontario.
