U. S. President Has Good Luck On Fishing Trip

Written for the Canadian Press By William Hogle of the Sudbury Star. BIRCH ISLAND STATION, Aug. 9.—(CP)—President Roosevelt has sampled the pickerel, pike and black bass fishing in this popular peace-time holiday resort area, and has gone home satisfied.

The President ended a one-week holiday trip here last week end after his party caught five to 10 pickerel and pike and more than 100 black bass with Mr. Roosevelt himself accounting for one third of the catch.

It was the first time the President holidayed in Canada anywhere but at his summer home at Campobello, N. B. He lived in his 10-car special train which stood on a siding at this picturesque Indian village, nine miles north of Little Current, on Manitoulin Island, largest island in the world.

The windows of the train looked out on the island—studded north channel of Lake Huron with the rugged La Cliche mountains in the background.

His chief guide was Donald MacKenzie of Little Current and chief pilot for his party was Charles Bradley, Little Current tugboat captain. William (Gus) McGregor chief of the Indian band at nearby Whitefish Falls and a descendant of the factor of the first Hudson's Bay Company Post in the Manitoulin area, also served as a guide.

A Real Guy To these three the President of the United States is "a real guy." Said Bradley: "He was as democratic as the name of his party. He was very interested in knowing

the depth of the waters, the soundness and the rock formations along the shore line."

Bradley also reported that the President enjoyed Manitoulin Island blueberries.

Even Paik (the President's black Scotie) took a liking to our blueberries.

MacKenzie said the President "as chatty and informal a man as I ever found on the fishing grounds." The guide reported that Mr. Roosevelt caught the biggest fish landed by the party, a 3-1-2 pound wall eye pickerel and a black bass weighing four pounds, two ounces.

The President went home tanned from the north Ontario sun. "This is the first tan I've acquired this summer," the guide said. The President told him: "I had thought I might burn on an outing like this."

He reported that the President "seemed mighty satisfied with the fishing and his holiday and said he was coming back to Birch Island" probably next year.

McGregor said the President told him: "You certainly know the fishing holes for these beauties. If I can get a few more like this maybe I'll have one left when I get back to Washington to prove to the press boys there that I was really on a fishing trip. They won't believe me without evidence."

This village became a "Little Washington" for the week of the presidential visit.

Residents of Little Current sensed that something unusual was in the air in the last week of July.

But when they learned who their visitor was, they respected his desire for privacy.

Precautions were taken to protect the visitor whose train entered Canada at Niagara Falls and was watched over carefully all the way to the special siding at Birch Island station. Secret Service men were quartered in a nearby lodge while U. S. Army men and R.C.M.P. constables stayed at the Mansion House Hotel in Little Current.
