SWISS RAILWAY TICKETS.

In Switzerland, where they have a Government railway system, the practice of issuing time tickets, on which the owners can travel at will on any of the railways and most of the steamers in the little republic within the time stipulated. These rates are made pretty low, as the following figures will show. One can secure a ticket good for fifteen days on all the railways of Switzerland for \$13.51; for thirty days \$21.23; for three months \$52.11; six months \$81.06 and for a year \$129.31. These privileges in the way of railway travel are enjoyed by a population of nearly three millions of people occupying nearly 18,000 square miles, and also by the multitudes of tourists which visit that most interesting and romantic country.

As is well known, the beauty of its mountain, lake and river scenery has long made Switzerland the sanatorium and recreation ground of Europe. More than 500 health resorts exist and the country has been described as one vast hotel. It is intersected in every direction by railways which give easy access to its mountain, lake and health resorts. And yet the traveller who visits Switzerland for a brief stay can obtain for himself a first-class passage on any or all of the railways for fifteen days for the very modest sum of \$13.51. We may rest assured that this is made to pay or the cheap rates would not be continued, for the Swiss are a very thrifty people and their Government is in most respects a model one. Cheap railway rates stimulate travel enormously, and the annual income to the country from tourists' visitors is a matter of millions.

Perhaps the nearest approach in this country to the Swiss system of cheap railway tickets is the 1,000 or 500 mile ticket issued at about two thirds the regular rate per mile and good till used. It is however altogether different in principle from the Swiss ticket, being good till used, and based upon the number of miles travelled instead of on a time limit. The essential resemblance is that in both cases the purchaser buys at as reduced rate at wholesale an extended privilege of railway travel. But the man who buys a thousand mile ticket gets just that much transportation, no more and no less. He is no doubt induced to travel more by having so many miles paid for in advance. The owner of a Swiss time limit ticket will naturally make the best use of his time consistent with his proper enjoyment. And he can easily travel 100 miles each day, mainly over entirely new routes, with lots of time and opportunities for sight-seeing during and between trips, thus making 1500 miles of railway travel for \$13.51 or less than a cent per mile. On a six months ticket he could travel at liberty, long or short journeys, for about fifty cents per day.

In Germany and other European countries they have what is called the zone system, giving an extremely low rate of railway travel within certain distances of principal centres, the reduced rate being designed to stimulate travel, which it has done enormously. There is an very great waste in the haulage of empty or half empty cars on the railways in America, which is mainly avoided in Europe, by the methods we have indicated

Very possibly there is something which we might learn from Old World methods, even after making due allowance for the differing conditions, notably the denser population and greater proportion of persons over there whose pecuniary means are very limited. But what an attraction it would be to tourists could it be made known that they could enjoy in our delightful summer climate and pretty scenery the like facilities for traversing the Island at cheap rates as are afforded in Switzerland.

The terms of peace which concluded the war in South Africa have been heartily endorsed by the leaders of both parties in the Mother Country and by the great organs of opinion which are the exponents of their views. Moreover the terms have met the approval of leading news-papers and serials throughout the civilized world. This unanimity of favor for the peace terms is found among leading publicists who held diametrically opposite views with regard to the war. But the Halifax Chronicle is of a different opinion. It has condemned the peace treaty in unmeasured terms, and still speaks of it as a Majuba surrender. Possibly but most improbably the Chronicle's readers may conclude that its editor is wiser than the hundreds of great men in many countries who have endorsed the peace with so much unanimity.
