

EDICT ISSUED IN REPUBLIC

Imperial Proclamation to Restore Peace Grants Republic

(Canadian Press.) PEKIN, Feb. 12—An Imperial edict issued today declared that in view of the evident desire of the people for a Republic and to ensure peace in the Empire again, Shi Kai is instructed to organize a full provisional Republican government and to confer with the Republicans as to the methods of Union ensuing peace.
