Plan Release of Stranded Vessel

MONTREAL, Aug. 10.—Plans for the release of the Rapids Prince, stranded since Sunday evening in the Lachine Rapids, have been completed by Captain John Donnelly, of Kingston, to whose firm the contract for the floating of the vessel has been awarded. Mr. Donnelly has telephoned to Kingston ordering the assembling of a wrecking plant to be immediately sent here. The plan calls for the installation of a pulling engine on a small island about one thousand feet up stream from the Rapids Prince. Securely anchored to a rock this engine will have a cable slung from it to the stern of the ship, which will be pulled up stream and the bow allowed to swing around until the vessel points down stream. The moment she is fairly in the channel the cable will be sharply released and she will "shoot" the Rapids as though on a regular trip.

An Aircraft Fleet For Home Defence

LONDON, Aug. 10.—With no limitation of air armaments in eight, Great Britain now plans to build a fleet of 500 airplanes for home defence. Critics of the extension of the air fleet regard it as putting a premium on air armaments. Premier Lloyd George announced this big building program in the Commons this afternoon, saying the decision to do so resulted from an inquiry by the Committee on Defence of the Empire. At the present time, Britain has thirty-one squadrons, only twelve of which are in the British Isles. France, however, will have, at the end of next year fully 220 squadrons, besides several hundred machines which can be drawn from civil aviation in the event of an emergency. It will cost nearly \$2,000,000, annually to maintain the new British home defence air force. The Premier indicated that if necessary there would be a further extension of the air service. It is understood orders for aircraft will be divided among five firms. It also is expected the new air fleet will include an all-metal type machine which recently has been developed here and that Handley Page, will be encouraged to go ahead with his "Slotwing" type, whereby the surface of the wing is made to expand and open out in flight like the feathers of a bird's wings. It is regarded as one of the most notable advances in aero-dynamic design in recent years. For many months there has been strong agitation to develop a powerful air fleet, because it has been argued Britain will be hopeless in the face of air attack in another war and her docks, cities and other plants will be at the mercy of the enemy. The Government finally has had to sanction the building of the air fleet demanded.

Germany Springs Trick on France

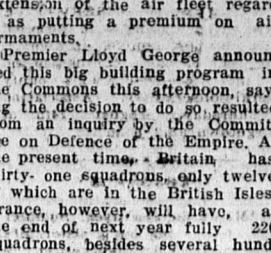
PARIS Aug. 10.—German banks within the last forty-eight hours have transferred to Holland and Switzerland between \$600,000,000 70,000,000 French francs which had been on deposit in American and other foreign banks in Paris. The Associated Press learned this afternoon. The money was hurriedly withdrawn, it is understood, in anticipation of its being seized by the French government as part of the penalties to be imposed on Germany for her refusal to pay the 2,000,000 pounds, installment due for private debts contracted before the war with Frenchmen. These penalties are to become effective beginning at noon tomorrow, and although their exact nature has been carefully guarded by the Government, it has been assumed that all German bank deposits in France, Alsace-Lorraine and possibly in occupied territory, would be confiscated to meet this payment. It is emphasized in official quarters that the funds on deposit in Paris were sufficient to pay more than half of the August debt installment. The Paris deposits, it was learned yesterday by telegraph from Poincare, last reply to the German Government in this question was received in Berlin. A very small percentage of the deposits of German banks has been kept with French institutions in Paris. This money has been entirely withdrawn. In the case of American and other foreign banks, the Germans have left nominal sums to meet day-to-day transactions. These foreign banks were surprised when the orders came to transfer the cash to Dutch and Swiss banks, but there was nothing for them to do but obey the request of their German clients. The money withdrawn was being held in Paris by the German banks for the account of German business houses and also for the German Government, the latter having been to establish credits in foreign currency in Paris, Brussels and London to meet reparations payments. Reports have also reached Paris banking circles, that the Germans had also withdrawn large sums from the banks in the occupied districts of Germany and from Alsace-Lorraine, but these have not been confirmed. The German reply to the Poincare ultimatum has not arrived in Paris, but official circles believe it will merely be another refusal and will not delay the imposition of the penalties.

Swordfishers of Cape Breton Busy

HALIFAX, N. S. Aug. 10.—Sword-fishing out of Cape Breton ports bids fair to become a temporary rival, as an industry, of the steel manufacture in Sydney, according to the Sydney Post in an article forecasting record breaking shipments of swordfish to Boston during the season now commencing. Last season the shipments from Louisburg to Boston, amounted to well over a million pounds and this volume will likely be far exceeded during the present season if the expectations of fish buyers in Cape Breton from New England are fulfilled. It has been said that the people who engage in the swordfisheries in Cape Breton outnumber those employed by the steel plants. The fish are caught, cleaned, iced, boxed and shipped in a special fleet of refrigerated cars to the most direct route to Boston, Louisburg is the starting point of the Nova Scotia fleet of one hundred sail which will go after the swordfish this season, but there will be many other crafts engaged in the fishery including a few from American ports. Nova Scotia fishermen have during the past few years made Cape Breton ports their headquarters, as it has been found that the fish strike that coast in larger quantities than in any other locality during the migration from the southern banks. The first kill is generally made the latter part of July in the waters between Scatarie and Guolin Island. The season is not about five weeks then the fish disappear and are seen no more until next season when

SHIPYARDS BUSY IN MANY

One who recently returned on an extensive visit in Germany reports great activity and secrecy surrounding the German shipyards. Britishers are especially busy from all places where built and reconstruction work is on. All activities within the Kaiser's realm show the great development and prosperity there is an abundance of work every body which scarcely fails to harmonize with the blue reports which are given out of the nation's leaders. At Hamburg cranes, slipways and locomotives are in readiness for immediate service, and were made for efficiency. He also took a 100 mile race in 53 minutes here yesterday, after his record-breaking fifty mile run in the Cotati sprint. The former record for fifty miles was held by Ralph de Palma. He made the mark at Sheepshead Bay, N. Y., on June 14, 1919, when he negotiated the distance in 26 minutes, 23 and 41-100 seconds. Tommy Hilton was second and Eddie Heane, third.
