## Well Known Horseman Passes Away

It was a great shock to the people of this Province when word was received that Mr. Frank J. Power, of Halifax, had passed away on Saturday night while preparing to come to Charlottetown to act as starter for the Exhibition races. Mr. Power had been coming to Charlottetown in that capacity for 32 years and was known to many thousands here. Up until about ten years ago he was an employee of the Post Office Department, Halifax, and during his holidays acted as starter at various race meets throughout the Maritime Provinces. One year he officiated on the Maine and New Brunswick Circuit and also spent an entire summer on the Western Fairs Circuit in Western Canada. Throughout the long period in which he was associated with harness horses and horsemen, he maintained an unblemished reputation for integrity. No one ever accused Frank Power of giving favors and no one ever attempted to get favors from him. His character was too well known to permit of this. Mr. Power was without doubt one

of the greatest starters that America has produced in the opinion of some of our most prominent horsemen here, who have had an opportunity of watching others perform in much larger circles. His famous "Pull up" which the drivers received when it was no go, saved their horses tremendously and one could always rely on it. The word "Go" was never given after the pull up warning had been issued. Last year at our Provincial Exhibition it was felt that Mr. Power was getting well up in years and some wondered whether he would be equal to the task of handling the big meet. As a matter of fact it was one of the best conducted meetings we have ever had here. There were very few scores and practically every horseman was satisfied. The racing at Halifax Exhibition was also under his direction and it was splendidly conducted. Mr. Power is survived by his wife, one son and two daughters, one of whom is Mrs. G. Halsey Hooper, of Charlottetown. To the sorrowing family, the Guardian extends sincere sympathy.

ADD BISLEY TEAM ... Yesterday's two matches—the Governor-General's greatest individual meet in the Dominion and the Empire match found in one case an unemployed carpenter and "dark horse" winning major honors. In the other, a team of eight stellar marksmen representing the Dominion beat the best "motherland" could offer by the slim margin of three points—and to a Hamilton, Ontario, woman, Mrs. Barringer, went the bulk of the spoils. Mrs. Barringer held the ticket of Sgt. Harold Ashling, of Toronto, in the associate members match, fired in conjunction with the Governor-General's Sergeant Ashling's aggregate score of 248 for the five ranges of the match was three points better than anyone else could do, and the victorious Mrs. Barringer collects more than \$12,300 as a result. The Empire match wound up the week's programme in a blaze of glory. The marksmen participating were the finest the Dominion could produce, while the "motherland" team was composed of eight veteran shots whose names were written on the Bisley roll of honor many times. It was a fight to the very last shot, and only superiority at the 900 yard range kept the Canadians in front. Ashling was three points in front of five other outstanding marksmen. Lt. G. F. Booth, England, Lt. R. A. Sweet, Hamilton, winner of the grand aggregate this year, C. S. M. G. M. Emalle, Toronto, R. S. M. R. Kiddle, Toronto and Staff Sgt. F. V. Shepherd, Ottawa. All five had scores of 245, but were placed as above by the "best score at longest range" method. In the match itself, more than \$3,000 is distributed in prize money with Ashling taking \$500 and the Governor-General's gold medal as his share of the spoils and the \$500 means comparative wealth to the humble Toronto carpenter, who for more than a year has sought for a job. That \$500, he said yesterday, would enable him to "carry on" until something turns up. Ashling was full value for his victory. In the first stage of the match, fired last Wednesday, he scored 104 out of a possible 105 to finish in a tie for first place with Shepherd and Lt. W. H. Jeffrey, Montreal. He was defeated in the shoot-off for the honor of leading the first stage. Yesterday, however, he scored a sparkling 73, two less than possible, at 900, and finished up with a 71 at 1,000 to make sure of the victory. The Empire match was featured by the shooting of Lt. James Bos, Montreal, one of Canada's outstanding marksmen. Bos smashed in a possible at 900 yards to put his team well in the lead and finished up at 1,000 with 47. His possible was the only one scored in the entire match. The event marked the second battle between the Canadians and the "Motherland" team for the Canada match fired at 300, 500 and 900 yards. Last Wednesday the Canadians went down to a crushing defeat by 15 points. Yesterday they obtained sweet revenge, although by a much narrower margin than they had anticipated. At 900 and 1,000 respectively the Canada team scored 364 and 358 for their total of 722 points. The British team had 358 at the first range and 361 at the second, whittling the Canadian point lead down to three points at the final stage amid intense excitement.

Continued from page 1 Table Conference, has brought consternation to the government which had believed he merely was maneuvering for position. Open Way For Negotiations While Gandhi told the Associated Press he had no intention of reopening negotiations, he left the way open for the government to make fresh overtures by assurances that the Congress would loyally and honorably fulfill its part of the Irwin-Gandhi contract and would refrain from renewing the civil disobedience movement unless driven to it. This gesture is regarded by shrewd observers as offering the only hope for the government to save the situation. The matter has shifted to London where Prime Minister MacDonald will have to decide whether it will be possible for the conference to work out a constitution for India without Nationalist participation. Should Mr. MacDonald decide the Conference can get on without Gandhi's co-operation, he runs the

Continued from page 1 conditions and providing work to lighten the effect of the former and limit the hardship which naturally follows. "We are grappling with this problem in a courageous and large way and I feel reasonably satisfied we will come through the winter better than we expected. If we do so, we will have accomplished much in limiting the social evils which follow as a consequence of discouragement and unrest, created through lack of work and the existence of real distress. "I do not know any country which is relatively better off than Canada," the Canadian Pacific Railway's president continued, "nor does my information lead me to think that there is any people which is dealing with its problems more courageously or more sanely." Mr. Beatty, who was accompanied by a distinguished party of financiers and industrialists, arrived here by special train from Sydney, where he inspected the plant of the British Empire Steel Company, and watched the rolling of rails forming part of the large order recently placed by the C. P. R. with the Sydney plant. Those accompanying him included: Sir Herbert Holt, president Royal Bank of Canada; Sir Charles Gordon, president Bank of Montreal, the Hon. Senator Smeaton White, president The Montreal Gazette; Major General the Hon. S. C. Mewburn, P. C., C. M. G. vice president Bank of Montreal; Dr. Duncan MacCallum, of Montreal; and W. A. Black, President, Ogilvie Flour Mills, and a director of the C. P. R. The C. P. R. president and those accompanying left Halifax before noon today, travelling on the D. A. R. to Kentville, accompanied by George E. Graham, vice president and general manager, D. A. R. They spent Thursday night at The Pines, Digby, and on Friday motored to the Lakeside Inn, near C. P. R. hotel at Yarmouth, crossing in the S. S. Princess Helena to Saint John on Saturday. Profound regret has been expressed by prominent Indian leaders that the fruits of the Delhi Pact, which promises India an area of peace and contentment, were in danger of being frittered away through what Gandhi considers the failure on the part of local administrators to observe the spirit of the pact.
