AT THE BAPTIST CHURCH.—The best meeting of the series so far, at the special services in the Baptist Church was that of last night. His message had been heeded by the people to whom it was spoken, and his efforts seemed to be a failure, and in his despondency God bade him go and see the potter working with his clay, and he went, and found him making a vessel on his wheel, and lo, the vessel was marred, and when the potter beheld it he broke it in pieces and from the fragments he made it again. The speaker said, God had a plan for every life, his plan was perfect, but man in his perversity and selfwill hindered God's purpose. Thus would God lift the prophet's gaze to himself as the ruler and maker of all, and as the clay was in the hand of the potter so was he in his hand, and though his life might seem wasted and broken yet God could take the fragments and make it a thing of beauty and use. The service was made the more impressive by the rendering of a beautiful solo, sung by Mrs. Freeman, the refrain being sung by the choir. You are invited to come up to the homelike church tonight, and enjoy the splendid service, which begins at 7.30.
