nobility, whose energetic and praiseworthy career in the faithful performance of eminent and responsible duties of public trust has well merited the Royal confidence reposed in you by our Gracious Sovereign King Edward VII.

For us it is a source of pleasure to honor your august person as a worthy descendant of a noble, brave and loyal race of men, who in the cause of King and Country distinguished themselves on the field of battle, and whose eminent services contributed in a marked manner towards the eventual formation of our great Dominion of Canada. With a similar sense of high appreciation for your person do we note that your distinguished ancestry were ever foremost in evolving those grand principles of Parliamentary Government, which make for the permanent welfare of a nation, and which in the course of time have been applied with such happy results to our Canadian Confederation.

As the Representative in Canada of our Most Gracious Sovereign, King Edward VII, we regard it a most special honor to welcome Your Excellency to our midst, and we respectfully request you to convey to His Majesty the sincere expression of our loyal attachment to the Throne. 
