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—PROTECTION NECESSARY —Hon. W. S. Stewart said we could all feel justly proud of the great natural wealth of Canada, its forests, its mines, its agriculture and the potentialities there were for development. We had a right to be particu-

larly proud of our fisheries and it was our duty to see they were properly conserved and developed. Our canned fish produce was known all over the world to be of the highest quality and fetched the highest prices in the market. In no part of Canada were there better fisheries than in our own Island. The splendid quality and fine flavor of our fish compared most favorably with the fish obtained elsewhere. Our oysters, lobsters, trout and mackerel were unequalled anywhere. Mr. Tidmarsh's excellent paper showed clearly the tremendous wealth we had in these fisheries and should be read with a very great deal of interest. There was one point that too much emphasis could not be laid upon, namely, the necessity for protection and development. It was notorious they had not received the protection they ought to have done. It would be calamitous if, for instance, the lobster fisheries became extinct for there were no better fisheries anywhere.

ANOTHER VALUABLE ASSET

In connection with our fisheries there was another point to which he might draw attention, and that was the value of the industry to the country as a means of training a hardy class of men—sea-faring men—men who must be depended upon for the protection of our shores against invasion in the event of war. It was patent to everyone that the next big battle when it came would be waged on the sea, and that fact should be borne in mind when they were giving consideration to that most important question the development of our fisheries. The men who would find employment in the fishing industry would be the class of men we would have to rely upon to man the navy, and it was not the least important part of the question they were considering that in developing our fisheries we were laying the foundation for the development of a hardy sea-going community. (Applause.) He begged to move a vote of thanks to Mr. Tidmarsh for his valuable paper.

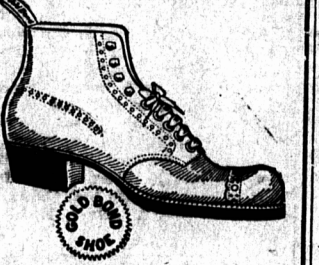

view of sending an expert to advise as to the best means of getting rid of the pest. The Dominion Government had done a great deal for agriculture by sending specialists to advise our farmers in every branch of the industry, and he did not see any reason why they should not be induced to send experts to assist in the development of our fisheries. He agreed with Mr. Tidmarsh that there should be a separate department of fisheries apart from the Department of Marine. There was a great future for our fishing industry but how soon that would be realized depended largely upon the action taken by the Dominion Government in giving the necessary assistance for development on the lines of the Department of Agriculture. (Applause.) After a vote of thanks to the Hon. Charles Dalton for his magnificent gift of an endowed sanitarium for tuberculosis, the chairman concluded the proceedings by expressing his appreciation of the large and influential gathering which had met under the auspices of the Board of Trade. In addition to Mr. Tidmarsh they were indebted to the Premier, Mr. Stewart and Mr. Higgs for their valuable contributions to the discussion, and he hoped the points and suggestions made would bear good fruit.

INCORPORATION OF STOCK EXCHANGE.

ALBANY, N. Y., April 3.—A plea for the passage of a bill to compel the incorporation of stock exchanges and to subject them to legislative and judicial control was made to the senate judiciary committee today by Samuel Untermyer, who said he appeared at the suggestion of Governor Sulzer. The mere act of incorporation, unaccompanied by supervision and regulation, Mr. Untermyer said, would be worse than useless.
