The occasion was the benefit meet to add to the fund for a monument to the late Harry D. Elkes who was killed at this track on May 30th of the present year. Seven hundred and seventy two dollars and fifty cents were contributed by the 2,000 spectators present. The five mile open event, amateur, was won by Marcus Hurley. Time—7:57 2-5. The half mile open also was won by Hurley. Time—1:17 1-2.

HUGH MacDonald of Sydney has been awarded the contract of transporting the Miramichi bridges, consisting of twelve spans of 240 each, building wharves, rest piers, etc., and supplying and placing all timber work, and the re-erecting of these bridges with a new draw span over the Hillsborough River, Charlottetown, on the Murray River branch railway. The contract price is about \$85,000, to be entered into at once.

MR. Haney, contractor for the Hillsboro bridge at Wallace N. S. is shipping about 750 tons a day from the Wallace Stone Company's Quarry. He has 38 men employed in quarrying and shipping it. A double track on an incline carries it to the wharf. The loaded cars going down take back the empties. Besides these shipments, the Company itself is making shipments to other points. H. C. Bead of Sackville, N. B., is President of the Company and Percy Black Manager.
