CRYSTALS DEFEAT ABBIES IN OPENER 4-2

Huge Crowd Sees Bruins Trim Toronto Leafs 6-3; Amerks - Rangers Draw

BOSTON, Jan. 4.—(CP)—Boston Bruins swooped inside of Toronto's wide defence almost at will while overwhelming the visitors by a 6-3 margin tonight before an overflow crowd of 16,000 at the Boston Garden. It was the Bruins third consecutive victory over the Canadian division pace-setters, who were undefeated in their six previous games. Ray Gettiffe and Roy Goldsworthy each scored twice for Boston and the other pair of tallies were supplied by little Bobby Bauer and Art Jackson. All of the Toronto counters were made while the Bruins played unorthodox and twice Nick Metz caused the red light to flash over the Boston net. Gordon Drillon, the league's high scorer, rang up the other Toronto goal. Little Cooney Weiland shared in three of the Boston's scoring plays.

Wings Blank Canadiens In Form Reversal

MONTREAL, Jan. 4.—Detroit Red Wings won their first game in 10 and their fourth of the season tonight, downing Montreal Canadiens 3-0 to end the long drought. The world champions set up a solid defence in front of brilliant Normie Smith and broke from the gauging Canadiens three times in the late stages to record the upset. Canadiens carried practically all the play through the early part of the game but the Detroit defence bumped hard and often and finally the Wings went ahead in the last minute of the second period. Johnny Sorrell got the goal. Canadiens used four forwards soon after the last period's start but the Wings broke away repeatedly and Red Beattie gave them a 2-0 edge after 13 minutes. Larry Aurie completed the scoring three minutes from the finish, banging the rubber between Will Cude's feet as he accepted a long pass from Johnny Sorrell. Babe Siebert was in the penalty box at the time.

Equestrian Star Is Winner Of Marsh Trophy

TORONTO, Jan. 4.—Second winner of the Lou Marsh Memorial Trophy, award annually to Canada's "outstanding sports competitor," was announced tonight as Lieut. W. Marshall Cleland of the Governor-General's Horse Guards, noted rider who scored a long string of victories in Canadian and United States horse shows in 1937. The award, first of its kind ever made in Canada to a star in equestrian sports, was announced by a committee of judges headed by P. J. Mulqueen, chairman of the Canadian Olympic Committee. The 1936 winner was Dr. Phil Edwards, famous half-mile of British Guiana and Montreal. Cleland, son of a wealthy Toronto distillery executive and a rider since he was six years old, established himself as one of the world's best amateur riders by winning international events at New York, Chicago, Montreal and Toronto. His home is at Troy, his father's estate near Hamilton. The judges made their selection from 22 athletes in a dozen or more sports. Among those nominated for the trophy were Bob Rankine of Preston, Ont., winner of the Crow Memorial Trophy, given annually by the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, and Syd Apps, Toronto Maple Leafs hockey star voted the outstanding athlete in a poll of sports writers from Toronto. Ontario sportsman and one of the selection judges, donated the trophy in memory of Lou Marsh, late sports editor of The Daily Star who died early in 1936. It is open to men and women athletes, professionals and amateurs.

U.S. Develops Young Davis Cup Prospects

NEW YORK, Jan. 4.—Don Budge is in Australia and not yet a professional, Bob Riggs is on the southern circuit and again winning tournaments, so for the present the international supremacy of United States tennis appears secure. But what of the future? That too, by a more involved process, is being provided for by the officials of the U. S. Lawn Tennis Association. The "providing" has taken the form of a nation-wide development scheme that takes in supervision and tournaments for boys (15 and under), girls, schoolboys, collegians, juniors and, above all, junior Davis Cuppers. The latter, on their title alone, receive the most detailed attention. In the year just past junior Davis Cup squads, with no age limit but generally taking 15 and 20, were established in 28 major tennis points throughout the United States. Each of these squads had the benefits of supervision by its own sectional committee and its own qualified coach. All of them were instructed in the aggressive tactics, the "watch-for-an-opening-and-make-the-most-of-it" policy that is the cardinal rule of Walter L. Pate, captain of the triumphant 1937 forces. "What the program already has done, and will continue to do," says Pate, "is to bring about a general improvement in the calibre" of tennis played by these youngsters. It will give them not only a thorough grounding in correct stroke production and general sportsman-like deportment, but will instil in them our principal idea—that, to be a top-flight performer, a boy must play aggressive tennis.

REMEMBER WHEN
First game of the newly-organized National Hockey Association was played at Montreal 28 years ago today, Canadiens beating Oshawa Silver Kings 7-6. The N.H.A., operating in opposition to the Canadian Hockey Association was enlarged 12 days later when the pick of C.H.A. teams merged under the National Hockey Association banner. The present National Hockey League was formed in 1917.
