### THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, June 10.—There was no improvement in the demand for grain from United Kingdom and continental buyers here today, and in consequence business was again very quiet.

On account of the further depression in the future corn market, at Chicago, spot prices here for cash corn were reduced four cents per bushel. American sample corn for export was quoted at \$1.02 and Argentine corn at \$1.01 per bushel. There was no change in prices for oats, and business was quiet.

The demand for spring and winter wheat grades of flour was inactive but values were unchanged.

The market for all lines of mill-feed was moderately active and firm. The trade in Standard grades of rolled oats was fair and he undertone was steady.

An active business was made in eggs and values were well maintained. The receipts were 2,464 cases.

Owing to the warm weather that prevailed today a somewhat unsettled feeling developed in the potato market, but there was no actual change in prices. Sales of odd cars of Quebec white "B" grade were made at \$3.00 for out-

The local butter market was again weak today and values were reduced another 1-4 to 1-2 cents per pound. This was attributed to the small demand and the large receipts. Eastern townships number one pasteurized was quoted at 33 1-2 to 34 cents per pound. The receipts were 4,749 packages.

Cheese prices were reduced another 1-8 cent per pound. Sales of western grades were made at 17 to 17 1-8 cents per pound. The receipts were 7,209 boxes.

OTTAWA, June 10.—Reports from the majority of Ontario country points indicate a falling off in receipts but quality is very good.

TORONTO, June 10.—Receipts are declining rapidly. Prices to retailers are extras 34 to 35, firsts 32 to 33, seconds 29 to 30.

Montreal—Market was steady. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered extras 30 to 32, firsts 28 to 29, seconds 25 to 26. An advance is anticipated on the better grades next week.

Edmonton — Market is steady with receipts very light. Prices to retailers are extras 33, firsts 31, seconds 26.

Calgary—Egg market is unchanged in tone and price. Receipts are very light. Country roads are very bad owing to heavy rains.

Vancouver — Market remains weak. Dealers are paying producers extras 25, firsts 23, seconds 13.

St. John — Market unchanged. Receipts show a decided falling off. A good demand is reported for storage. Extras are selling for storage at 33 1-2 in new cases.
