ST. PAUL BOXER SERIOUSLY ILL

Billy Miske's Fighting Days are Over—Has Been Knocked Out But Once

MINNEAPOLIS, Dec. 30.—Billy Miske, of St. Paul, heavyweight boxer is seriously ill from Bright's disease, it became known today. Physicians announced his condition was a trifle better than yesterday when he was near death, and added that Miske's fighting days are over if he recovers. Miske, who in more than a hundred fights in his career, was knocked out only once and that by Champion Jack Dempsey. His last fight was with Bill Brennan at Omaha two months ago, which he won by a knockout. He is 29 years of age, married and the father of three children.

The squad were put through their paces after which coach "Ches" Campbell expressed in glowing terms as to the physical condition of the players, also with the way they are working out especially Frank Cronin the "kid" of the Abegweit roster, who, Campbell reports, is showing headwork and speed to burn and is sure to be heard from this winter when the champions start to "mix it up" with other aggregations.
