Two New Track Marks Set On Grand Circuit

AGAWAM, Mass., July 31—(AP)—Frisco Dale and Dean Hanover flashed around Agawam's one-mile track Saturday to set two new records in Grand Circuit racing for this section before a crowd of 4,300.

Frisco Dale, a chestnut stallion owned by Paul Hungerford, of Sausalito, Calif., and driven by the veteran jockey, Sep Pann, went the first mile of the 2 1/2 mile race in 2:09.12, a new track record for this section. The old time was 2:02.12.

The second mile was won by the same pair with Lene Ace, owned by Thomas Thomas of Cleveland, Ohio. Hanover's last performance was in an exhibition mile. The two-year-old bay colt went the distance in 1:59.34, to set a new track record for New England. The distance was 2:00 and was made by Lou Dillon at Reaville.

Somerville Beaten In Extra Holes Match By 31-year-old Missouri School Teacher

LONDON, Ont., July 31—(CP)—Canada's amateur golfing championship rested today in the capable hands of a likeable young southerner whose sensational extra-holes win over Sandy Somerville was the biggest of all surprises that the week-long tournament provided.

The feat of Ted Adams, 31-year-old Missouri school teacher, was almost unbelievable to the 2,500 persons who galloped about the course of the London Hunt and Country Club Saturday.

But seeing was believing, and the boy from Columbia, Mo., showed them at the 39th green, winning the long struggle one up.

It was over his home course where he knows almost every inch of fairways and greens that Somerville lost the title, the sixth he has held.

When Adams rapped down a three and a half foot putt at the 39th to win, the huge crowd gave him a real ovation and nearly mobbed him.

Adams on Saturday carried the hottest putter exhibited in the tournament. He banged down putts from all over the greens, from a few inches to 50 feet.

Where Adams was strong on the greens, Somerville's usual sure touch was lacking. He missed several ordinary but would sink without trouble. But with his irons, Sandy played a beautiful game, steadier than these shots than Adams.

One of the most remarkable things about this championship final is that not once was Somerville in front. Three times Sandy, playing his cool, deliberate game, squared the match—twice in the morning and once in the afternoon.

But the Missouri boy, whose golfing lessons could be counted on the fingers of one hand, refused to take part in the Dominion tournament starting in Toronto tomorrow.

Provincial Rifle Association Dates Back To Year 1861

In 1861 the Colonial Rifle Association was organized in order to promote the shooting of the British in the month of August was named as the opening day for the first competition and sharpshooters from many outlying districts while they gathered to divide the prize money, seven cash prizes. Old records give the rules and conditions in vogue at the time as follows: First range, two hundred yards, target 2 feet by 6, bulls eye 3 inches diameter, centre 24 inches; and range 300 yards, target 4 feet by 6, bulls eye 3 inches diameter, centre 24 inches; and range 400 yards, target 6 feet by 6, bulls eye 3 inches diameter, centre 24 inches. Positions at the first range standing, second and third ranges, kneeling. Value of each shot striking the targets were: one, centre 2, bulls eye 3 points.

The Range Officers at this first Rifle Association meet were the Hon Colonel Longworth and Captain DeBlois. All rifle companies in the colony had the privilege of being represented by ten men. The meeting was held at the Government House in front of the Government House was selected as the site with the targets on the waterfront near Fort Edward. Competitors fired in order of rank and seniority and the match was opened by the Hon Colonel Longworth who commented on the right of the line and continued to the left until each man had fired five rounds. The meet was closed by two days. The prize winners were: 1st prize, silver cup, presented by His Excellency the commander-in-chief, Lord Governor Dundas; Gunner D. McKinnon, City Artillery. 2nd prize, seven pounds, ten shillings, Private S. McRae, Dundas Rifles. 3rd prize, seven pounds, Private J. Bear, St. Eanor's Rifles. 4th prize, six pounds, Private P. Batch, Wheatley River Rifles. 5th prize, five pounds, Private P. Hickey, Irish Volunteers Rifles. 6th prize, four pounds, Private W. Kennedy, Dundas Rifles, Southport. 7th prize, three pounds, ten shillings, Lieutenant McDonald, Orwell Rifles.
