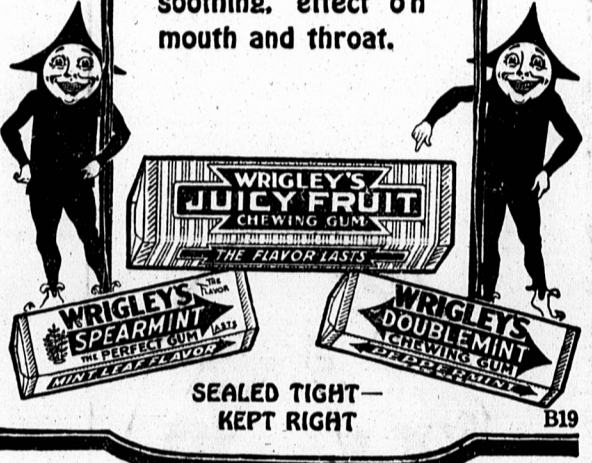

—SCHOONER ARRIVES.—Schooner Maud Weston, arrived in Summerside Friday morning with a cargo of lumber consigned to M. F. Schurman and Co., Summerside.

—WILL BE DELEGATES.—The Presbyterian General Assembly meets in Toronto next month. Rev. Mr. Mitchell of Summerside and Rev. Mr. Goodwill, of Kensington with Rev. Mr. Taylor of Charlottetown are delegates from P. E. Island to the meeting.

—SUMMERSIDE CITIZEN DEAD.—The death took place Saturday morning at the home of his father, Mr. Thomas Johnson, Summerside, of his son, Frederick W. Johnson at the age of 19 years, after a long illness. He leaves to mourn his mother and father, two brothers, Arthur at home and Frank of Moncton, two sisters, Mrs. J. E. —NOTABLE IMPORTATION.—Mr. W. A. Matthews of Summerside has imported from London, Ont., at a high price the celebrated trotting stallion "Governor General", by General Watts, 2.06%. The above celebrated animal arrived in Summerside Saturday morning by rail and after being harnessed up and driven around the streets attracted the attention of many horsemen. —HOSPITAL MEETING.—A meeting of the trustees of the Prince County Hospital was held last week when bills were submitted and ordered to be paid. The president, Mr. H. T. Holman read some correspondence in regard to X-Ray machine which owing to the present electric light system of the town, could not be installed, but would be, as soon as the 110 volt, 60 cycle direct current was installed in Summerside, 56 patients were admitted during the month of April and the visiting committee report the state of the hospital satisfactory in every respect. The committee recommended a double window in the operating room and also a tile floor. Some discussion took place in laboratory and new sterilizing system which was left over for consideration at the next meeting.
