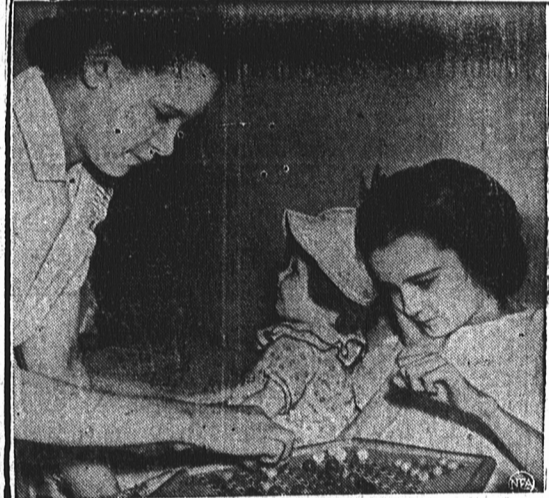
Perhaps across every woman's happy smile is inspired by her symbol of happiness.

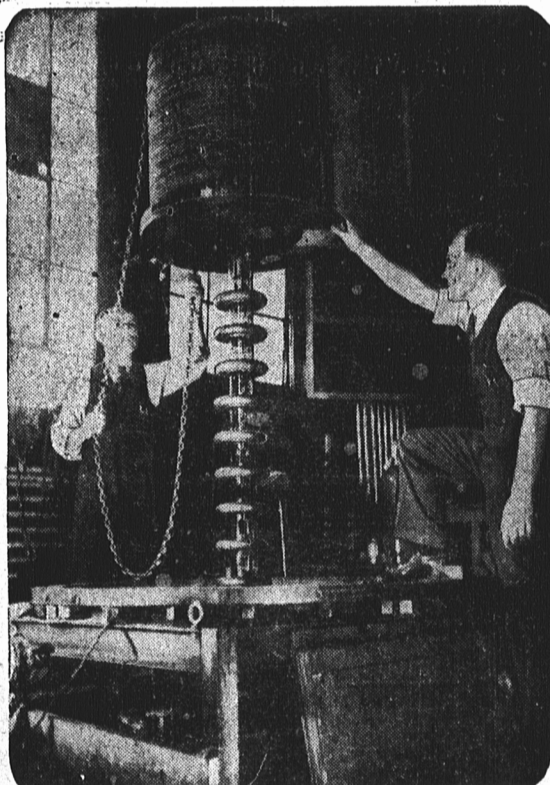

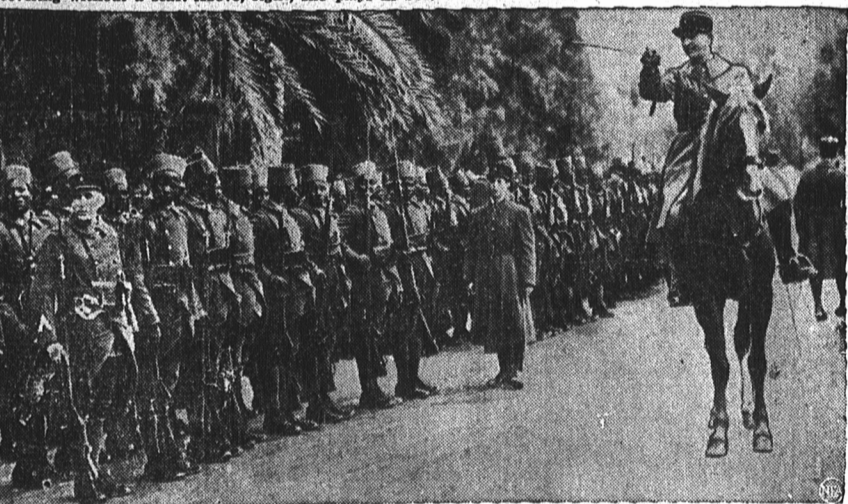


With power equal to that of 500,000,000 worth of radium, this new million-volt X-ray machine is expected to be of invaluable aid in the fight against cancer.
