MR. HARRY BROWN CLARKE

Drives Out Pain

P. E. I. HERO

Guardian readers will have reason to be proud of the fact that one of Canada's heroes was born on Prince Edward Island. On June 8th, 1895, Stephen Hector Munn first saw the light at Wood Islands. "Steve" possibly heard Horace Greeley's famous urge "Go West, young man, go West," for in 1916 our hero went to Vancouver, B. C., and joined the Fire Department in that City, in 1917 he was loaned to the Royal Canadian Navy Reserve, and was engaged until 1919 on Patrol out of Halifax, N. S.

The story of "Steve's" bravery is as follows:

On July 8th, 1927 a fire occurred at the Royal Alexandra Apartments on Bute Street, Vancouver. The equipment from Hall No. 6 to which station Munn was attached was first on the scene. There were six floors, and in a few seconds the 4th, 5th and 6th floors were ablaze. Capt. Archie McDiarmid and Fireman Munn ascended to the burning floors and succeeded in saving many lives. Capt. McDiarmid was burned severely and was in hospital several weeks. Stephen Munn's naval training stood him in good stead climbing to the roof he let down ropes and with flames raging around him, succeeded in lowering several persons to safety. Going back into the building which by now was a roaring furnace, Steve discovered others unconscious and they in turn were rescued.

The building fire escapes were inadequate and were obstructed by painted windows, chairs and in some cases gas stoves were placed in front of the windows which gave access to the escape in the holocaust 8 lives were lost. After the fire Mr. Harold H. Duggan, the local Secretary of the Royal Life Saving Society got together a committee and heard evidence of the bravery of three men of whom our hero was one. The committee forwarded this evidence to the Royal Canadian Humane Society, who awarded the men bronze medals for bravery. On Friday, Jan. 27th in the presence of a large Mayor L. D. Taylor pinned the medals on the breasts of the three heroes. Capt. Archie McDiarmid, Fireman Stephen H. Munn and J. T. Corbett. His Worship read the citations which accompany the awards and the record of our own native son reads as follows: Stephen Hector Munn, Fireman, No. 6 Fire Hall, Vancouver, B. C. in the face of great danger, at the terrible fire at Royal Alexandra Apartments, July 8th, 1927, saved several lives by lowering ropes from the roof of the blazing building, afterwards entering the various rooms and saving several others, many of whom were unconscious.

For his bravery and devotion to duty the Governors of the Royal Canadian Humane Society have pleasure in awarding Fireman Munn the Bronze Medal.

This is the first time in Canada's history that the award has ever been made for saving life at fires. To show how modest is our hero, corresponding with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John D. Munn, who still reside at Wood Islands, Steve has never mentioned the honour that has been bestowed upon him. In fact it is only through our Vancouver correspondent that we have the exact facts before us that we have the extreme pleasure in publishing the story of our native son's heroism.

Our congratulations to Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Munn of Wood Islands on having such a hero for their son, etc., etc.

RECEIVES MEDAL
(The Vancouver Sun)
Mid the plaudits of an audience which thronged the large auditorium of the King Edward High School Friday night, a trio of local heroes received visible recognition of the bravery they had displayed in saving human life in disregard of their own.

They were Captain Archie McDiarmid, Fireman J. D. Corbett and Fireman S. H. Munn of the local fire department, and the occasion whereon they risked their lives to save others was at the Royal Alexandra apartments on July 8th last, when eight lives were lost in the fire which devastated that building.

Simple pieces of bronze were pinned on the breasts of the three men by His Lordship Mayor L. D. Taylor but each of those tiny pieces of metal bore across the top the significant word "Bravery" and the round edge of the front of the medal was a wreath of laurel.

The Mayor told the audience the story of the heroism exhibited by the three firemen and complimented each individually on the act, after which he presented each with a copy of the letter sent by the Royal Humane Society with the medals, and decorated the trio.

Tribute was paid to Messrs. H. H. Duggan and A. Svecneski of the Royal Life Saving association, who were instrumental in bringing the heroic acts of the three firemen to the notice of the Royal Humane society.

No one in the gathering was more visibly pleased at the decorating of the three heroes than the veteran head of the fire department, Chief Carlisle, who occupied a place on the platform during the proceedings, and who received a tremendous ovation as he made his way to the place allotted to him.

Following the presentation the Fireman's band gave a concert comprising a complete program of their own with the exception of one item.

INTERESTING DEMONSTRATION

Show Rooms of A. Horne & Co., Crowded to Hear Lecture on Chevrolet Chassis—Films of General Motors Proving Ground Shown.

The show room of A. Horne and Company was filled with a capacity audience last night to hear a most interesting and instructive lecture delivered by Mr. M. P. Biggar, Chassis demonstrator from the head office of Chevrolet Motors, Oshawa, and Mr. W. E. Reid, factory representative for New Brunswick and P. E. Island.

The lecturers were provided with the most important members of the Chevrolet Chassis including a complete engine and transmission with some of the metal of the housing taken away so as to show the transmission gears in position, also the various working parts (pistons, crank, valves, etc.) of the engine. This made it possible even for those who had but a modest knowledge of mechanics to follow Mr. Biggar as he explained in a very clear and lucid manner the different details of construction.

The cooling system with its Harrison radiator, positive acting water pump and thermo-static control was first of all dealt with. The action of the valves was explained, and the various points of superiority of the overhead valve system, as used in the Chevrolet, Buick and high powered racing cars, was touched on.

In this year's model, invar pistons are used, said the speaker. This metal has a lower coefficient of expansion than almost any other, making it especially mistake to pistons construction, where great ranges of temperature are met with. These pistons are 12 1/2% lighter than those used in last year's model. The manifold is of an improved type, arrived at by means of experiments with glass manifolds, and coloured mixtures. It is so designed as to reduce eddying to a minimum.

The lubrication pump and the A. C. oil filter and air cleaner were employed. It will turn 160 revolutions per minute. The starting lighting and ignition systems are of the celebrated Delco-Remy type. The clutch used is a single plate dry disc with eight contact surfaces. It requires no lubrication, or other attention and only twenty pounds pressure suffices to disengage it.

The steering gear is of the semi-reversible full worn and gear type, and for this year's model the ratio has been increased to the proportion of 9 to 1.

The springs are of unusually generous proportions. They are built of Chrome Vanadium steel, and this year are provided with rebound control plates.

A real axle of the most modern type is provided. The differential assembly is mounted directly on the propeller shaft, thus preserving perfect alignment at all times, and ensuring easy and perfect adjustment, also facilitating removal for repairs, should these ever be necessary.

The speaker then touched on the four wheel mechanical brakes, with the interval expanding emergency brakes acting on the rear wheel; the wheel base of 107 inches—4 inches more than in last year's model, and the newly designed framing of the car, in which the depth and thickness of each member had been increased, so as to provide greater strength.

Following this demonstration Mr. Biggar, some very interesting moving picture films of the General Motors proving grounds, were shown. This portion of the entertainment was introduced by an address by Mr. Reid. In the course of his remarks he said that General Motors had the second largest plate glass factory in the world. He brought vividly to the minds of his hearers an idea of the vast scale of the operations of the General Motors Corporation, and its subsidiary companies. The proving grounds, films of which were about to be occupied an area of 1245 acres and all sorts of roads from smoothest concrete, to roughest, dirt surface were provided, so as to give the cars the most gruelling test possible.

All makes of cars are driven on this testing ground, and many of them are tested to destruction in 75,000 mile drives. All the models that General Motors bring out are now tested in this manner.

The films which were then exhibited showed the cars performing under all sorts of conditions and over all sorts of roads—in rain, snow, ice, dust, mud, gravel and rocks. They were driven through a large water bath to test their carburetors and ignition, up steep grades on high gear to try out their hill climbing ability, and dragging a dynamometer car, which threw on them a load of ten times their own weight per long distances to test their cooling and lubricating systems.

Views of the comfortable quarters provided for the engineers and mechanics employed at the testing grounds, and an aeroplane view of the properties were also shown.

Mr. Edwards, (Frontenac-Addington) asked a question calculated to excite public interest and he wanted to know if the government by direct correspondence or negotiations with the government of Mexico had intimated its desire to have the Consul General of Mexico, Toronto, recalled. The speaker put the question in it by stating that in view of the importance of the question the Hon. gentleman should give notice, and the Prime Minister "equally agreed with him."

The Minister of Marine and Fisheries informed the House that the statement about Canadian vessels being supplied by American coal for bunker purposes was entirely incorrect.

In reply to a query from Mr. Smith (Stamford) responsible for the government, complained of Mr. Cardin promised to have the matter thoroughly investigated.

Mr. Bourassa was discursive as usual and it would be difficult to indicate his objective in any particular instance. Mr. Cantley as might be expected, devoted a great deal of time to the coal and steel situation in Nova Scotia in the obvious inferences as to a remedy.

Mr. Dunnington on his stand as to the selection of Fort Churchill as a terminus for the Hudson Bay railway assuring him of the sympathy of the Maritimes in an effort to satisfy the aspirations of the west for a more direct grain route to Europe.

The other two speakers covered the ground already much trodden during the debate in the particular reference to problems as they affected their constituents locally.
