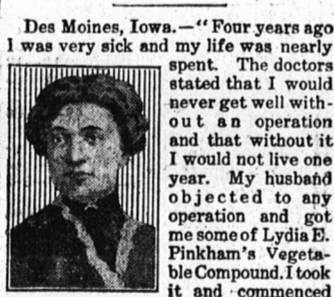

**THE MAIL SERVICE**—The ferry steamer arrived at port yesterday morning at 11.30. She brought large freight and passengers. The Stanley left Cape Tormentine at 5.30 Monday evening for Charlottetown direct, abandoning the western route owing to the ice conditions. She was all night in the storm working her way towards this port meeting heavy fog all the way. Off St. Peters Island she became fastened in a heavy ice jam and was released by the Prince Edward arriving here shortly before noon. Both steamers remained in port during the remainder of the day and will resume their trips this morning, taking mails, passengers and freight. It is expected that the Stanley will make the return trip today, after which each will make a one-way trip daily.

**THE THIRD WAR BUDGET MAY CALL FOR HALF BILLION**

OTTAWA, Jan. 12.—With parliament opening today there is some speculation as to the third war budget of Sir Leonard White. The general opinion seems to be that it will call for an expenditure for at least \$400,000,000 and possibly may be as high as \$500,000,000. This, of course, will include the ordinary expenditure of the government as well as the war expenditure.

Last year's budget called for a total expenditure of \$300,000,000 of which, however, only \$100,000,000 was specially for war purposes. Prior to this at the first short session called immediately after war began, there was a vote of \$50,000,000. Since then there has been a total of a domestic loan of \$100,000,000, but half of it was utilized for British credits for the purchase of war munitions in Canada.

Altogether, therefore, the sums appropriated for actual war expenditure by Canada total \$200,000,000, the \$45,000,000 New York loan being for domestic capital expenditures.

But expenditure is now much heavier than it was a year ago, amounting now to considerably over a million dollars a day. That has to be provided for, but as there is enough in the treasury to carry till Spring it will be unnecessary to vote a whole year's expenses. A year ago the forces authorized to be raised for overseas service amounted to 100,000, at present 220,000 is authorized.

The estimated expenditure for a force of 250,000 men has been placed at \$235,000,000. The prospect of a much larger force will necessitate the increase of this sum to a very considerable extent.

**ALLIES WILL BE THE VICTORS**

LONDON, Ont., Jan. 7.—Frederick Palmer the famous American war correspondent, who recently returned from the British front in France and Flanders, in addressing the London Canadian Club at noon today, predicted that the war would be over with in a year; with the Allies the victors.

Mr. Palmer declared that a year ago the Germans were winning, although the British did not realize it, but the advantage is now entirely with the Allies.

**TROOPS CALLED OUT TO QUELL RIOTS**

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio, Jan. 7.—Ten buildings are burning, the fire is not under control, and threatens the whole East Youngstown, business section, as a result of the steel mill riots tonight. State Guardsmen from Alliance are expected here by 11 p.m. Youngstown and county authorities declare the situation is beyond their control.

A wild mob was still surging through the streets while the authorities were powerless to control the populace. The estimated fire loss is \$300,000 already.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Jan. 7.—Two regiments of the Ohio National Guard, comprising more than 1,500 men, to-night were on their way to Youngstown to assist local authorities in the strike of steel workers in that city, another regiment—the Fourth—was mobilized in this city to await orders to proceed to Youngstown.

Before daybreak tomorrow it was expected that 2,500 Guardsmen under command of Brigadier-General John C. Speaks, of Columbus, would be in Youngstown, ready for duty.

Shortly before five o'clock Governor Willis received an urgent request for troops from Sheriff J. C. Umstead, of Mahoning County. This was followed by a report from General Speaks, who had been sent to Youngstown as a representative of the Governor that the situation was grave and that troops would be necessary to assist the local authorities in maintaining order.
