The Glouce Bay Gazette says:—There seems to be an impression among some Prince Edward Island captains that a license fee is charged here if they retail produce from their vessels. It is said that some vessels have gone to port Miramichi and North Sydney under this impression. There is no license fee charged here however. In Sydney a license from \$10 to \$100 may be charged. A writer in the Record pointed out that a license of \$20 on a schooner of ordinary capacity meant only about 2 of a cent per bushel of potatoes. Relating this information in "spudology" to its lowest terms will show that it only means a tax of 1-1000 of a cent per "spud."

The District Sunday School Convention will be held in the Methodist Church York next Thursday, Nov. 21st. The following is the program:—afternoon session starts at 2.30 at which time Rev. J. M. Station Agent Chabres, of Pt. du Chene, reports that traffic has been heavier during the past month than at any time since he has been stationed there. In that time over two thousand barrels of oysters principally for Quebec and Montreal have been shipped from this Province, as well as some three hundred cars of produce, sixty cars of sheep and lambs for United States points, besides large quantities of oats, potatoes, and other produce.

The marriage of Miss Lillian Welsh of this city to Allan Joseph McCabe, of Fort Augustus took place last Tuesday morning in St. Dunstan's Cathedral, by the Rev.
