By RAY REK OTTAWA, May 3 (CP) - A shortage of nurses continues to plague the Victorian Order of Nurses for Canada, and this problem, growing more acute as the service expands, is bound to come up for discussion at the order's annual meeting, opening tomorrow.

"There already are 108 branches of the order in cities and towns across Canada," a V.O.N. official said today. "More offices are expected to open when we get the staff."

Some 250 delegates and nurses from all parts of the Dominion have gathered in the capital for the meeting of this 51-year-old public health organization.

It is expected that a new president will be elected at an early session, succeeding Senator Norman Paterson of Ottawa, who is resigning, after five years as V.O.N. president.

A new chairman of the management committee also will be elected. W.R. Creighton has served as deputy chairman for the last six months because of the illness of C.H. Butterworth of Ottawa.

Highlight of the two-day conference will come Wednesday afternoon when the group gathers for its general session at Government House.

Conservatives In Nfld. Issue 14 Point Platform

By Joseph MacSweeney ST. JOHN'S, May 3 (CP) - The Progressive Conservative Party tonight announced a 14-point platform for the first Newfoundland election to be held May 27.

The party - which already has named 17 candidates for the 26-seat province - says that it believes Newfoundland must have greater financial resources to maintain the high standards of public services which now prevail and declares its intention "to strive with all its power for improved financial terms."

It had earlier been intimated by national leader George Drew on a campaign tour here that the financial terms of Confederation were unsatisfactory to the Progressive Conservative Party.

It was predicted here that Mr. Drew will return before this island's first polling. Provincial leader H. G.R. Mews, who announced the platform following a party rally last night, also promised the immediate setting up of a labor department.

At least two labor officials will run on the Progressive Conservative ticket in Newfoundland.

The party also declared its intention to fight any infringement on provincial rights. The province of Newfoundland was not to be relegated to the position of "a pensioner of the Dominion." The burden of taxation would be distributed fairly between the province and the Dominion and Newfoundland would seek federal grants as necessary for education, health and welfare.
