Butter: first grade creamery prints, jobbing price, 38; first grade solids, jobbing price, 37 1-2; Que No. 1 pasteurized current receipt price 36 3-4; no. 2, 35 3-4; no. 1 wholesale price 37 1-4; no. 2 36 1-2.
Cheese: Western and eastern white, price to factory, Montreal FOB, west and east white wholesale price 16, which price is applicable to cheese manufactured on and after May 26, 1941, for shipment to the United Kingdom.

Montreal Exchange

MONTREAL, Aug. 7 (CP)—Gains and losses were pretty evenly divided in trading on the stock exchange today.
Constructions were a strong group, with Algoma Steel, Canada Cement, Dominion Bridge, Cypsum and Steel of Canada posting fractional advances. Most activity was in rails and carriers where Canadian Car and Canada Steamships, common and preferred were in slightly higher territory, but C.P.R. slipped to lower ground.
In utilities, Montreal Power, Power Corporation and Shawinigan had above the average turnover but all finished unchanged. In metals, Hudson Bay was a fractional gainer while losers were Bulolo, Noranda and Smelters, but Nickel was unchanged. Imperial Oil and International Petroleum were active but national arrears. In miscellaneous section, Imperial Tobacco showed some activity but remained unchanged.

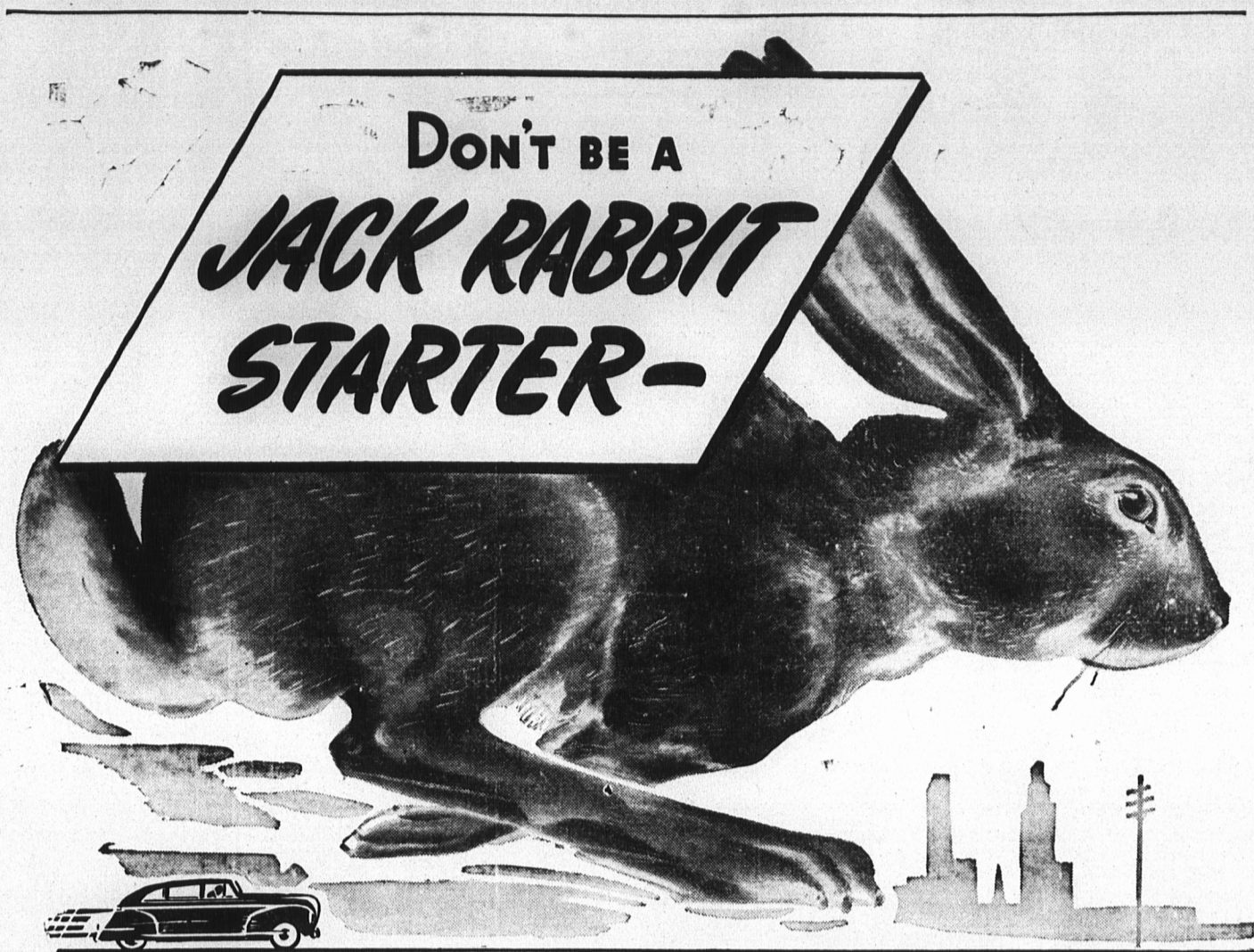

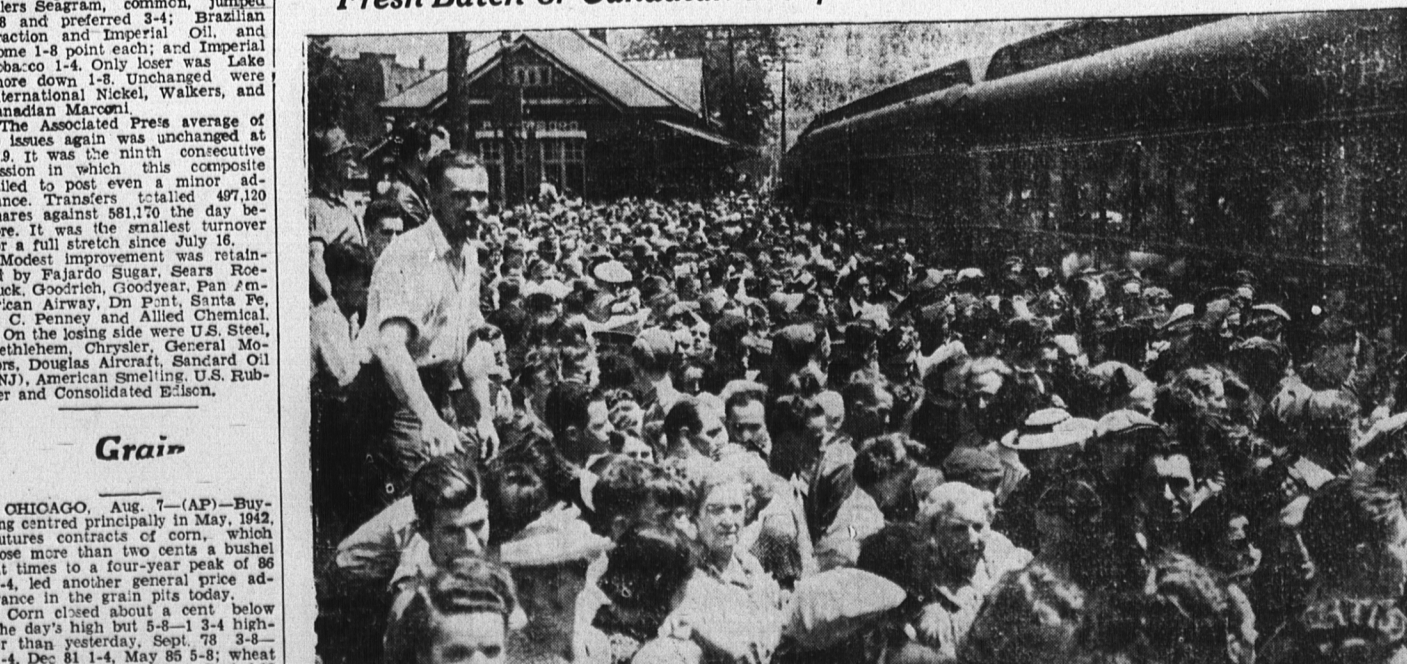
