THE PROVINCIAL CAMPAIGN.

Some time before December the provincial election may be expected. So Premier Haszard is reported to have stated at the meeting in Bradalbane on Tuesday evening. It looked like the opening meeting of the campaign.

In the afternoon Hon. Matthew Smith and John E. Sinclair son of the late honored and Honorable Peter Sinclair were nominated as Liberal candidates to represent the First District of Queens. These are good names and should bring out the full strength of the party in their support.

But The Patriot and The Examiner do not agree as to the sort of meeting that was held in the evening. The Patriot tells of "a rousing Liberal rally" at which "stirring addresses were delivered by Premier Haszard, A. B. Warburton and others."

The Examiner says there were just seventy two persons present when the Premier began, and Mr. Warburton did not have so many listeners. Our readers can adjust these reports to suit themselves. Regrettably the Examiner's enthusiasm over a Liberal meeting and The Patriot's enthusiasm over a Conservative gathering always leave something to be desired.

The same afternoon the Liberal convention for the Fourth District of Prince was unanimously nominated the present representatives, Hon. S. E. Reid and Capt. Joseph Reid. The latter had been before nominated in Summerside, but his old constituents will not let him go.

The Guardian is not predicting what the people will do in the coming election. That is for the people themselves to say. We look for a pretty general and tolerably stiff contest all over the Province. But if the Liberal party is to control the destinies of the Province longer, the four gentlemen nominated by the two districts above referred to will have as good chances as most of being in the majority.

We have just one suggestion to offer today with regard to the election. It is that the two leaders, Premier Haszard and Mr. Mathieson, K. C., should be allowed to get their elections by acclamation, in order that they may give their time to enlightening the electors throughout the Provinces, on the issues of the campaign.

Moncton has followed St. John in taxing the incomes of Federal Government and Railway officials. The new taxes are said to amount to \$10,000 a year, which will be resisted by appeal to the courts. Of course, if these taxes can be collected and retained the system will be enforced throughout the Dominion.

Another English electoral division Pudsey in Yorkshire, has elected a Unionist to replace a Liberal, and in so doing reversed a former Liberal majority of 3,500.

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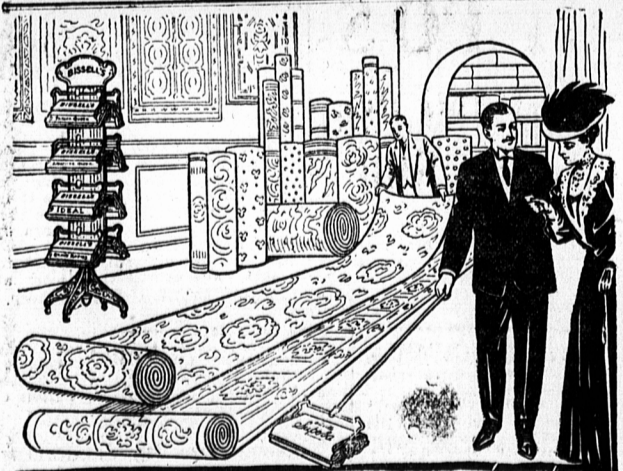
