## Fire Dept. Essay Competition

The Summerside Fire Department have found it necessary to postpone the closing date of their prize essay on "Fire Loss: Its Cause and Prevention." The date originally set for the close of the Contest was May 10th but it has been found necessary to fix June 1st as the last date on which entries may be submitted. Arrangements are being made for the Provincial Fire Marshall to give an address to the High School pupils on the subject of the competition.

The Competition is divided into two classes: Class A for Grade 10 and 11 pupils; Class B for pupils under grade 10.

Competition is open to all pupils of the Summerside High School and St. Mary's Academy.

All essays must be written on one side of the sheet only and each sheet must have a margin.

All entries must be in the handwriting of the entrant and be initialed by his or her class teacher.

Maximum length of Class A entries is 1000 words and of Class B entries, 750 words.

All entries must be submitted by June 1st, 1933.

No name or other identification mark must be shown on the paper submitted. Age, name and school grade must be written on a separate slip and pinned to the essay.

Judges' decision to be final. All entries submitted to remain the property of the Summerside Fire Dept.

The local dept. are arranging for suitable prizes for the two best essays in each class.

The importance of the teaching of fire prevention to the young folks is stressed by the Dominion Fire Commissioner in the annual report of his dept. for 1929 when we are told that out of the 233 persons who met death by fire in that year 121 were children. The property loss for this period amounted to \$47,499,746 which is a per capita loss of \$4.85 for every man, woman and child in the Dominion. When these facts are considered it is very evident that the Fire Dept. are pioneering a much needed want in our community life.

## CHURCH'S FINANCES NO CAUSE OF WORRY

TORONTO, May 8.—There is nothing in the financial condition of the Presbyterian Church in Canada to cause worry or alarm," declared James Dutton, layman of Peterborough, speaking in connection with the budget report at yesterday's session of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston.

Although the givings of congregations had decreased a little more than 15 per cent, there had been a corresponding decrease in expenditures. In spite of the decrease in expenses, the work had suffered in no way, explained Mr. Dutton; and in spite of decreased givings, the church had succeeded in decreasing the accumulative debt by \$10,000 during the past year.
