Islander Awarded D.S.C. Baptist Church



Lieutenant Robert C. MacMillan, D.S.C., (above) of Charlottetown, who was recently awarded the Distinguished Service Cross in the King's New Year's honors list. He was the only Canadian naval man to receive this honor in the recent decorations. Lieut. MacMillan enlisted with the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve in June 1940. Since then he has been on duty in the Mediterranean and during the siege of Tobruk distinguished himself by assuming charge of a minesweeper, when the Captain became incapacitated, and shooting down five Stukas in a week. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. L. B. MacMillan of this city.

Filled to capacity For Prayer Service

Another large congregation packed the auditorium and the school room of the Baptist Church, and many had to stand during the service.

This interesting and devotional service was presided over by the minister of the Church, the Rev. L. Judson Levy.

The singing by the choir, led by Professor Smith, rendered a service which was in harmony with the prevailing spirit of the meeting and was greatly appreciated by the worshippers.

The scripture lesson was read by the Rev. Hugh Miller M.A. of Trinity United, after which Mr. Miller voiced in prayer the deep feelings of those present. In intercession, the grave issues of the hour were not forgotten, and inspiration of sin and consecration to the great task before all of us were brought before the throne of grace. At this juncture of the meeting the officers of the British and Foreign Bible Society held a short meeting to bring reports of the year's activities before the congregation. The speaker for the evening was Rev. Neil Herman of the Central Christian Church, whose subject was "The Bible The Word of God." The preacher said in part: "If this book, we call the Bible, is not inspired, which is the only other book in all the world is inspired, then the Bible falls to pieces by its own testimony and by those critics who believe only what they want to believe."

"As never before, the Church demands the Bible as the Word of God. We have our divisions. We are sadly conscious of our isms. But let us face the facts. We are not divided by reason of religious psychology or any other cause. We are not split into groups because of tradition or scholarship. We are divided by the Word of God. Call that a difference of interpretation. Call it what you will. The fact remains."

The call to the Church is the call to the integrity of the Word of God. Nothing short of a whole Bible—equally inspired—will heal the wounds, which bleed her unequalled, which we are now upon us."

"We talk about our democracy. What is the truth? The truth is, all genuine, all practical, all religious, has always been and always will be built on the Bible as the Word of God."

"A weak democracy and a weak Bible have always gone hand in hand. The Bible is the Word of God. And now we talk about rebuilding democracy. We tried rebuilding after the last war and we failed. Shall we fail again? We shall not fail, if we build our foundations on the Word of God, inspired by the Spirit of God and tested by the fires of the centuries. And if we are going to rebuild our democracy we better begin to build now."

"This proud, bloodthirsty tiger of Berlin is bent but not broken. Germany must fall in humble confession upon the Rock of Ages, or the Rock will grind that Empire to powder. And that Rock is the Word of God, which Germany threw out into the streets, and in selfish decision, burned to ashes."

"Our enemies have gone on the rampage of war. The world is stark mad and on fire. In the midst of our raging fires there is an organization which has not ceased, day or night, to send forth the stream of sanity and goodwill to all the nations of the world."

"That organization is known as the British and Foreign Bible Society. It has given the Word of God. This Society has served all nations and tongues and has served with cost and less blame of trumpets than any other organization of like kind, in the world."

"This Society demands our sympathy, our prayers, our money. If we neglect this great institution, if the British and Foreign Bible Society fails, we fail to stand or fall together."

"In conclusion, the speaker urged and pleaded for a ministry of prayer which will move the Almighty God in Christ on behalf of the world. I believe we must get beyond the saying of prayer, to a prayer passion, which lifts the soul above the fear of men and contemplates the needs of the world, and powers it with the very heart of a prayer-answering God."

In response to the appeal for co-operation of our women in the operation of the Government to prevent inflation of prices Mrs. F. J. Casey, Convener of War Services, said that a telegram was sent to headquarters in Ottawa, following Mr. Gordon's broadcast on Dec. 8th. His reply expressed appreciation of our assurance of co-operation. The Convener stated that the outstanding work of the month past was the preparation and shipping of twelve ditty bags (value approximately \$5 each) to the men of the Merchant Marine. Besides knitted goods these bags contained a variety of articles independent of the needs of a seaman, also canned goods, gum and candy. Six cases of blankets were packed at Red Cross in December and six months' gowns completed. In last month's published report, it was stated that one case of blankets were packed; this should have read ten. Ten dollars was donated toward the Blankets for Britain through the Nurses Alumnae of the City Hospital. The War Services Women's Committee work in the Red Cross, cutting, sewing or packing as needed.
