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## Mar. Golf Tourney Off To Good Start

### Large Entry List To Compete For Amateur Title

### Percy Streeter Of Saint John Will Begin The Defence Of His Title In The Qualifying Rounds Today

(Canadian Press) Over the rolling fairways of Charlottetown's Belvedere Golf Club, 90 or more of the Eastern Provinces' best club welders will get away tomorrow in the qualifying round of the Maritime amateur golf championship. Late tonight 84 had sent in their entries, and several laggard golfers were expected to fill in their forms before D. W. Wallace, of Fredericton, H. S. Gregory, of the Riverside Club, Saint John; and E. L. Hickman, of Bally Haly, St. John's, Newfoundland, tee off as the opening trio in the morning.

Percy Streeter of Saint John will find ample competition in the group of players challenging for his title, won last year on his home course. Among them are Carol "Gint" Cain, who won the championship in a thrilling 39-hole final against Streeter two years ago; and young Don "Diddy" McNaughton, who broke through in 1929 as a Monctonian and is now playing from Riverside, Saint John.

Many others will be in there fighting for a place in the select sixteen along Belvedere's 6,104 yards tomorrow. There are Don Raymond, of Yarmouth, a qualifier in 1931; Vic Saunders, Secretary of the Charlottetown Club, who should be difficult to trim on his own course, Earle Turner, the ambidexterous Fredericton professor, Fred Risteen, of Fredericton, and invading delegations from St. John's, Newfoundland; Cape Breton; Moncton; Digby; Yarmouth; Amherst and Truro.

Officials of the local course said tonight they expected the tournament to turn out some of the best golf and closest competition seen in a Maritime meet in years. Early arrivals took it easy today as they split up in foursomes and played the traditional President's vs. Vice President's match. The team headed by Club President L. D. Murray was over the Squad led by the vice president, Dr. C. H. Beer, by a 20 to 17 score. No exceptional totals were handed in, but the first flight of Maritime golfers were well to the fore with consistent cards.

Tomorrow's qualifying round should give ample opportunity for drama. This year's meet will pack the punch of two ex-champions matching strokes with the present title holder. And Cape Breton has added a father and son combination in R. P. Findlay and Allen Findlay of the Lingan Club, Sydney. Jack Harris, of the Ken-Wo Club, Wolfville, former Nova Scotia champion and runner up in the Marlimes is present. And so are F. M. Dayton, entered from the Royal Bank, Moncton; and E. Dunn, who hails from the Inverness Yacht Club.

### WINNIPEG BOY BEATS PEARSON

### Harry Coleman Subdues Hamilton Speedster in 100 Yards Final.

(Canadian Press)

FORT WILLIAM, Aug. 7.—A smooth-striding Winnipeg youth attained the pinnacle of fame in Canada's track annals as he sent Canada's fastest sprinter, Bert Pearson down to defeat in the 100 yards as the Dominion's two-day track and field meet concluded today. Pearson came back strong to win the 220 yards.

Foremost honors of the meet went to young Harry Coleman, Manitoba track and field association star as he subduced the slight fair haired Hamilton youth, reckoned master of the 100 yards. "I guess I was lucky," said Coleman after he had drawn a tremendous cheer from the crowd by turning back Pearson in the 100. Coleman was away to a perfect start and he lasted long enough to keep the fast-closing Pearson at bay until he reached the tape. His time was 9 4-5 seconds.

James Worrall gave Montreal its lone title in the running high jump when he cleared the bar at five feet, nine inches. Philip Pearson, North Bay Collegiate Institute's sensational jumper, who soared over five feet 11 inches at the British Empire Games in 1929 at Hamilton, was forced to take second place.
