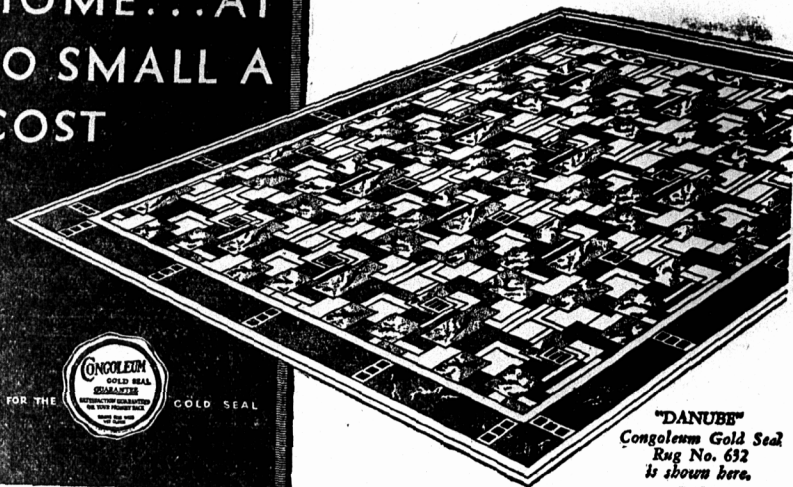

Newspapermen To Convene

TORONTO, April 27 - (By The Canadian Press)-Next week newspaper publishers and editors from all over the country gather for the annual convention of the Canadian Daily Newspapers Association and The Canadian Press, opening with a meeting of the Board of Directors of the latter on Monday, May 2.

At the annual dinner of the Daily Newspaper publishers Thursday evening, the chief speaker will be Sir Willmott Lewis, K. B. E., Washington correspondent of the London Times. H. B. Muir of the Kingston Whig-Standard, president of the Canadian Daily Newspapers Association, will preside the speaker will be introduced by M. E. Nichols, president of the Winnipeg Tribune, president of the Canadian Press, and will be followed by B. C. Nicholas of the Victoria Times.

Sir Willmott Lewis, the distinguished correspondent of the London Times at Washington, as a writer and lecturer on politics and economics is as well known throughout the United States as in England. He was born in 1877 and educated at Eastbourne and in Germany and France, but says himself the better part of his education was received from the vantage of his arm chair which, in his house in Washington, is completely surrounded by tomes in all branches of sociology.

Sir Willmott's first hand knowledge of world politics was obtained during his extensive travels in the East and Europe. He went to the Far East first in 1899, saw the Boxer campaign of 1900 and thereafter travelled and wrote in China and Japan. In 1904-5 he was upon the Comandurs.
