MEETING.—The board of management of the Children's Aid Society held a meeting in Charlottetown yesterday. The reports of the executive were submitted as usual and the following resolution passed: That the Association greatly regretted the death of the late Mrs James Warburton and expressed the deepest sympathy with the members of her family.

MCGILL EXAMINATIONS.—Island students have made a good showing at McGill this year, judging from the results of the examinations which were recently posted. In Second Year Arts, Clyde Auld of Charlottetown, wins Class I. In History and in English Literature, leading his class in both subjects, Class II, in Latin; Clarence Tidmarsh wins Class I in English Literature, Class II, in History and Class III, in Latin. In Third Year Applied Science, R. S. McBeath, of Marshfield wins Class III in Geology.

EVANGELICAL ALLIANCE.—Last evening a large number of the clergymen and laymen of the city attended a meeting in the St. Paul's Parish Hall for the purpose of discussing the formation of a branch of the World's Evangelical Alliance. After a general discussion a branch was organized for the City of Charlottetown. An executive committee was elected consisting of 16 members, two representatives from each Protestant church, a clergyman and a layman. Rev. Dr. Fallerton was appointed President. It was decided that the Alliance would meet every first Monday of each month at 4 p. m. The meeting then adjourned till the first Monday of February.

A BRAWL.—On Sunday afternoon between four and five, citizens on Water St. were disgusted by the sight of a man undoubtedly intoxicated who was driving up and down the street at top speed, and hardly able to sit up. At the corner of Queen and Water streets he got out of the sleigh, leaving the horse standing in the middle of the street while he had a hand to hand fight mingled with loud curses and talk, with another man on the corner as intoxicated as himself. It was remarked that all the police should not be in church at the same time and that it would be advisable to keep some of them on active, worldly duty rather than have the Sabbath desecrated in this fashion.

TRAINS DELAYED.—The recent heavy snow storm interfered greatly with the progress of the trains on the P.E.I.R. many of them becoming stuck in the large banks. The mail train which left Charlottetown at 6 o'clock this morning for Summerside did not reach there until 11:30 a. m. The train from Tignish to Charlottetown is now clear, however, and the trains on the western branch will have no more difficulty with snow. The train from Georgetown was delayed very little and arrived here at 11:30 o'clock this morning but the Souris train hadn't reached Mt. Stewart at that time. The Murray Harbor train was an hour and a half late in reaching the city.

ZERO.—Charlottetownians experienced the first zero weather this season. It descended upon the city last night and during the morning the walking was very difficult. The snow work in the way of clearing the streets, about four and a half inches fell on the level but in some cases where there was no shelter, the drifts reached a height of five feet and more. No longer can citizens exclaim that they have not enough snow. It will be a few days, however, before the roads will be beaten into condition for good sleighing.

MILITARY MEETING.—A number of the military men of the city gathered at the drill hall last evening to discuss the matter of forming a military school here. If the promoters can get enough men to join the school they will apply at headquarters for permission to form same.

DEAD IN TEXAS.—The death occurred in Waco, Texas, on Dec. 16, 1913, of Robert Bell, formerly of West River, P.E.I., where a wide circle of friends and relatives reside. Besides a sorrowing widow, in Texas Waco, he leaves to mourn one brother in British Columbia and three sisters in Lowell, Mass.

A MISTAKE.—It was stated in yesterday's Guardian, in reference to the application of The Record Fox Co., Ltd., for incorporation, that the proposed capital stock of the company was \$400,000, this information being taken from the Royal Gazette. But it has been pointed out that this is erroneous; that the proposed capital of the company in question which is being formed primarily with the object of breeding cross-foxes, is \$50,000, divided into 2,000 shares of \$25 each.

INSPECTION OF SCHOOLS.—It is the intention of the Superintendent of Education, Mr. R. H. Campbell, to start on Wednesday on his annual inspection of the primary schools in the country. He originally planned to commence his tour yesterday, but the weather interfered with these arrangements. However, yesterday he commenced his inspection of Queen's Square School, Charlottetown which he will continue today and for part of tomorrow. On Wednesday afternoon he leaves for Souris, and will inspect the school in that district. Returning to the city on Saturday he will leave again on Monday and will then go west as far as the P.E.I. to inspect the schools in that part of the country. It has been customary for the Superintendent of Schools only to inspect the first-class schools, but in conversation with a Guardian representative yesterday, Mr. Campbell said: "I hope this year to give more attention to the poorer, the smaller schools. I'd like to see the poorest as well as the best we have got."
