This hat was also unadorned save by two sweeping ostrich willow plumes—very large and handsome, and while being a model of simplicity—it is a model of real fashion and up to date. Price \$30.00.

A dainty Battenburg Hat—suggestive of summer warmth and sunshine is of a very large semi-drooping shape, with a band of Crisse and an elegant of cerise rosebuds. An elegant simple model—but speaking style features in every line. Price \$7.25.

One could go on indefinitely with descriptions, for there is no lack of them—but must close with mention of one more, having the rest to be seen when the store opens tomorrow evening for the pleasure of its fair patrons.

This hat was the new Helmet shape—a copy of the Military Helmet, modified and made suitable to fair young faces—and those who like to be different from the rest. It was of white straw—and around the lower part was draped black lace beaded with white—while two long velvet wings fell over the back—and made a chapeau which from the view points of uncommonness, beauty and style is unequalled in an immense and particularly beautiful showing. There is real pleasure in store for the fair sex tomorrow evening—pleasure from the mere fact of looking at such beautiful creations of a real artist—and pleasure in selecting from an array so varied that there is no fear of having a hat just the duplicate of the one your most intimate friend may have.

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PROVINCIALIST ASSUMES A NEW CHARGE

HAVERHILL, April 3—Welcomed by a large congregation, Rev. James L. MacLaughlin began his pastorate yesterday at the Advent Christian Church on Winter Street. He preached his first sermon at the morning service, taking as his subject "Co-Laborers With God." Mr. MacLaughlin preached a series of evangelistic sermons at the Advent Church in January and it was at that time that he attracted the attention of the members of the church and a call was subsequently extended to him to become the pastor of the church. In accepting the call he felt that he was coming among friends and when he stepped down from the pulpit at the close of the service yesterday he was extended a warm greeting and assurance of the earnest support of his parishioners.

Mr. MacLaughlin is a native of Prince Edward Island, having been born at Montague 42 years ago. He was raised and educated in the schools on the island and began preaching at the age of 19, and was familiarly known as the boy preacher by those with whom he labored. He left Prince Edward Island twenty-five years ago and has spent the greater part of his life since attaining his majority in the state of New Hampshire, where he has preached for the past twenty years, serving three different churches. He was ordained at Alton Bay, N. H., eighteen years ago. His first charge was at Groton, N. H., where he was located for nine years, and his third at Hampton, N. H., where he has been for the past six years.

He was married Jan. 30, 1892, to Miss Mary J. MacLeod, a native of Prince Edward Island, at Warren, N. H. They have three children, two girls, Pollie A. and Lillie M., and one boy, Daniel M. MacLaughlin. Rev. Mr. MacLaughlin will continue to live in Hampton until the latter part of June, when his children will complete their school year, and then he will take up his residence in this city.

Mr. MacLaughlin has devoted much time to evangelistic work, being at one time associated with Rev. G. M. Little of Warren, N. H., and his greatest success has been attained along this line.


