Advertisement for 'Canucks Take 1,500 Prisoners In Drive' with the text 'WITH THE CANADIAN CORPS ON THE ADRIATIC, Dec. 19 (D.L.V.)—(CP Cable)—The Canadian Corps' bag of prisoners in their new Italian offensive stood at more than 1,500 tonight (Tuesday) as the Canadians on their Navajo Canal bridgehead running north from the town of Segrate, Italy, threatened that strongly-defended town about 12 miles west of Ravenna. This marked the end of the third day which was notable more for noise than movement—except for a 1,200-yard advance and subsequent withdrawal yesterday (Monday) by the Canadians on the left flank behind the Vecchia Canal before being forced to retire. Vigorous patrolling continued, however, with flare-ups here and there as scouting parties clashed. But the busiest men on all sides were the gunners and mortar crews doing their best to rattle their opponents. Never in this theatre has a battlefront been so littered with dead, many as a result of artillery fire, even before the infantry has had a chance to engage in small-arms action. The enemy wounded total is high, judging by the number of ambulances and stretcher bearers parties operating daily in view of the Canadian troops. It will be the second Christmas in the line for these men who a year ago battled in the Adriatic ports of Ortona. ANGIO RUSTICO W.I. The next meeting is to be at the home of Mrs. James Stevenson, the roll call to be answered with a New Year's resolution. The meeting then closed with 'The King.' The entertainment consisted of a book charge and two interesting contests were enjoyed. Refreshments were served by the hostesses while social chat and intercourse were indulged.
